
































































When the World was Ours by Liz Kessler - TMSA Big Read 2023


Vienna, 1936. Elsa, Leo and Max have always been best friends, a special team of three. Then the Nazis come.

Car-Jacked by Ali Sparkes - TMSA Big Read 2020


Jack Mattingly is a genius. He has an IQ of 170. He speaks fluent Mandarin and Latin.


I Have No Secrets by Penny Joelson - TMSA Big Read 2019


But as her bond with Marla grows, Allison begins to ask herself: where is home? What is a family? And most importantly, who am I, really?

A twist of fate brings them together and gives them both hope. But is hope enough to mend a broken world?




When Mr Dog Bites by Brian Conaghan


Two Can Keep a Secret by Karen M McManus


A Good Girl's Guide to Murder by Holly Jackson

Dumplin' by Julie Murphy





The Places I've Cried In Public by Holly Bourne





Ana, a hotel maid whose family is suffering under the fascist dictatorship of General Franco.


Lives and hearts collide as they unite to uncover the hidden darkness within the city.

A darkness that could engulf them all . .




Bloom by Kevin Panetta (Graphic Novel)

Ace of Spades by Faridah Àbíké-Íyímídé



Guard Your Heart by Sue Divin




The Lie Tree by Frances Hardinge
