Adapting Shakespeare for the University of Hertfordshire



Earlier this year a number of English, Drama and Art Gifted and Talented students were invited to work collaboratively on a competition project for The University of Hertfordshire. The task was simple, adapt Shakespeare. The students were given the choice of adapting either *Othello* or *The Tempest* in any way they wished. Over two days Arts and Literature skills were combined to complete two very different pieces of contemporary theatre and two very thorough evaluations.

Aaron, Rowena and Noa worked on adapting 'The Tempest' into a video performance for which they composed the music, created the visuals and did a voiceover. The rest of the students worked on Othello,

exploring which characters have the power and certainly put an interesting connotation on Shake-speare's play. The students were given feedback on their work and they said how it had been a fun project to get involved with and helped them explore themes of Shakespeare more and gave them a fresh perspective on his plays with their own interpretations.

After a lot of discussion from the University's judging panel I was delighted to learn that both groups had been awarded a runner-up trophy and gift vouchers.

Emily Caddick Bourne and Craig Bourne from the University of Hertfordshire both commented on the students' hard work with the project which was a pilot project this year and impressed by the quality of the work submitted. There were 6 schools involved and both Marlborough's entries were so good they merited runners-up prizes of Love to Shop vouchers and a trophy.

Bletchley Park



A group of Year 9 ACES students had the opportunity to visit Bletchley Park. Home of British codebreaking and a birthplace of modern information technology. It played a major role in World War Two, producing secret intelligence which had a direct and profound influence on the outcome of the conflict. The day was organised for the students to have a guided tour of the park followed by a codes and ciphers workshop. The students were shown how messages sent by the German forces which had been encoded were intercepted and taken to Bletchley Park by motorcycle despatch riders to be decoded by the primarily female workforce. Some of them even got the opportunity to use the Enigma machine to see how the coding worked.



Although Mr Evershed's hobby is bird watching he also has a keen interest in anything to do with nature and the environment around us. He spoke to the students about how we should all observe what nature there is around us, how to employ all of our senses and sometimes even a sixth sense which can be affected by the weather, season or time of day.

The students brief was to go out and take a photo and then write an article about their picture. After being given some photography tips by Ms Burton, about not just getting eye level shots but getting in close and framing their shots the students were able to explore our site in a very different way. Although Storm Doris was threatening, the students captured some amazing photographs and some even caught a glimpse of blue sky before regrouping to write their article. Ms Redfern and Mr Evershed were on hand to help assist and ensure their written pieces were as beautifully crafted as their photographs.



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
"Roll up, roll up, read all about it!"


