
























































Spellstone by Ross Montgomery


A Pocketful of Stars by Aisha Bushby



A tough career for anyone, but surely impossible for Billy, who has a stammer. How will he find his voice, if his voice won't let him speak?




Crater Lake by Jennifer Killick

High-Rise Mystery by Sharna Jackson





That's where my best friends Josie, Michael and Tom come in. Because you see, together we've come up with a plan. . .




Twitch by M G Leonard


My Brother is a Superhero by David Solomons


Pele by Matt and Tom Oldfield

Wonder by R J Palicio










Super Sidekicks: No Adults Allowed by Gavin Aung Than

Best Friends Forever by Lisa Williamson



Three most definitely IS a crowd, but Lola is not going to lose her BFF without putting up a fight!




Owen and the Soldier by Lisa Thompson


Run Wild by Gill Lewis




The 13-Storey Treehouse by Andy Griffiths and Terry Denton

In a treehouse with a bowling alley and a lemonade fountain, Andy and Terry are too busy with flying cats and sea-monkey mishaps to work on their next book.




School for Skylarks by Sam Angus


Wonderscape by Jennifer Bell


The Ickabog by J K Rowling


Tales of Terror from the Black Ship by Chris Priestly

Eleven-year-old twins Myles and Beckett Fowl enjoy adventure and mayhem while helping a troll escape nefarious forces that want his magic.




The Hobbit by J R R Tolkien






