World Challenge 2017 Costa Rica and Nicaragua



After 2 solid years of fundraising, the day had finally come for us to say goodbye to England and set off to Costa Rica and Nicaragua on our 24 day expedition. The group consisted of 13 students from Year 11 and 12, Mr Hogan and Miss Wainwright, and our Australian world challenge leader George. After staying the night in the school staff room, we woke up at 1am to get on the minibus to Heathrow airport. Twenty- six hours later we finally arrived in our hostel in the depths of San Jose and it was evident how far away we were from home.

After a couple of days acclimatising to Costa Rica, booking accommodation and travel for later stages in the expedition; the first of our rest and relaxation activities began – white water rafting! Everyone had an amazing time on the rapids and it was a great way to kick off the expedition. A few days later we jumped on a bus and headed into the tropical dry forest. Here we spent three nights camping in the forest amongst huge iguanas, spiders the size of your hand, scorpions, howler monkeys and flies that just wanted to eat you alive. During the 3 days, we did a couple of hikes through the forest, one of which ended up at an idyllic beach surrounded by palm trees and we all decided to have a swim in the crystal blue water. It wasn't all good however, as two of our team stepped up sea urchins and one ended up having to go to hospital to get the spines removed from his foot.

Once back in civilisation, we spent a few more days in Costa Rica before heading across the busy border to Nicaragua. We began work at a deprived primary school near Granada where we helped to build a new eating area for the children in the morning and then played games with them in the afternoon. This was an extremely humbling part of the trip, just to see how little some of the children had and yet, they were some of the nicest, happiest kids we had ever met.




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The final part of our trip was our 5 volcanoes in 5 days trek. Starting on Telica volcano, we summited 5 volcanos, 3 active and 2 dormant, and camped each night with a different local family who cooked dinner and breakfast for us each day. The third day was by far the best as it involved volcano boarding, a sport exclusive to Nicaragua's Cerro Negro volcano. This involved sitting on what was pretty much just a plank of wood and hurtling down the side of a 730m high volcano in roughly 40 seconds! It was an adrenaline junkie (ie Mr Hogan's) dream.

All in all it was a truly magnificent, eye-opening experience that I think everyone should get the chance to do at least once in their lifetime. We started off as 13 individuals from different year groups, not knowing much about each other to finishing as one close-knit family and the experiences we gained out of the trip you wouldn't get any other way.

So whatever year you are in, maybe you might like to start saving now for a trip of a lifetime! **Adam Skinner Year 13**
