



The lads that we had on station were a credit to the school and as far as I'm aware had a good day – albeit I think the physical activity session was a bit of a

Both are training very hard preparing themselves for the British Nationals, mentally and physically as these fights are going to be the hardest of all the competitions they have attended.







By the time day three rolled around, we were all already speaking and understanding more French. First stop was the D-Day Landing Museum in Arromanches, with the Battle of Normandy being the key point of



focus. As the museum is built on the site of the artificial harbour, we

could see the vestiges of it in the sea and imagine the story the guide was telling us. Then we went to a 360° cinema where we watched a film in memory of all those lost during World War 2.

Next, we had a picnic. Afterwards, we visited an American war cemetery and memorial. The eerie beauty, size and respect of it all were incredibly overwhelming and humbling.

costume competition with another school from Wales, followed by a disco. We danced and sang for hours.

Now the day we had been waiting for had finally arrived – the French market and Mont St Michel! At the French market, we took the opportunity to stuff our faces with crêpes and macaroons. Then we had another picnic. Next, we visited the Mont St Michel (the number 1 tourist

attraction in France outside Paris). For the rest of the day we explored the little island, which is topped with a beautiful medieval monastery. The breath-taking location inspired awe within all of us.






A visit to one of our pop up shops is a great shopping day out for families. We aim to create a fairytale scenario with


