SPIDER WEB CHOCOLATE FUDGE MUFFINS

Ingredients

-50g dark chocolate -85g butter -1 tbsp milk, water or coffee -20g self-raising flour -1⁄2 tsp bicarbonate of soda -85g light brown sugar -1 egg -142ml sour cream

For the topping

-100g dark chocolate

-100g white chocolate

Method

Preheat the oven to fan 170°C/conventional 190 °C/gas 7, and line a muffin tin with 10 paper muffin cases. Break the chocolate into a heatproof bowl, add the butter and liquid. Melt in the microwave on Medium for 30-45 seconds (or set the bowl over a pan of gently simmering water). Stir and leave the mixture to cool.

Mix the flour, bicarbonate of soda and both sugars in a bowl. Beat the egg in another bowl and stir in the soured cream, then pour this on



the flour mixture and add the

cooled chocolate. Stir just to combine – don't over mix or it will get tough.

Spoon the mixture into the cases to about three quarters full. Bake for 20 minutes until well risen. Loosen the edges with a round-bladed knife, let them sit in the tins for a few minutes, then lift out and cool on a wire rack.

For the topping, make two piping bags out of greaseproof paper (or cut the ends off two clean plastic bags). Break the dark and white chocolate into separate bowls and melt in the microwave on Medium for 2 minutes (or over a pan as in step 1). Put 2 spoonful's of dark chocolate in one bag and the same of white chocolate in the other.

Working with one muffin at a time, spread with dark chocolate from the bowl, letting it run down a bit, then pipe four concentric circles of white chocolate on top. Using a small skewer, drag through the circles at regular intervals, from the centre to the edge, to create a cobweb effect. Repeat with four more muffins. On the remaining five, spread over the white chocolate and decorate with the dark.

PHILOSOPHICAL RAMBLINGS WITH DR E. MURRAY: MORAL DEVELOPMENT

Philosophical Quote:

"Right action tends to be defined in terms of general individual rights and standards that have been critically examined and agreed upon by the whole society." - Lawrence Kohlberg

Lawrence Kohlberg was a psychologist that considered philosophical questions, such as 'how does our conscience develop?'. Many, such as Aquinas, would answer this question by using God-given reason, essentially stating that if we think about something enough we will know what the right thing to do is. But Kohlberg didn't like this, so he came up with his own theory.

Kohlberg believed that conscience and morality is developed throughout life, and that they are developed through six stages, which are split up into a further three stages. I suppose it is a little like Shakespeare's stages of man.

Pre-conventional morality includes stages:

Obedience and Punishment – the individual does good to avoid punishment.

Individualism and Exchange – the individual realises different people have different viewpoints.

This type of morality is generally accepted by nine year olds and younger. It is mostly shaped by the expectations of adults and the consequences of following or breaking rules.

Conventional morality includes stages:

Good Interpersonal Relationships – the individual is good in order to be seen as a good person by others.

Maintaining the Social Order – the individual obeys rules to keep a stable society.

This type of morality is accepted by most adults, and is when we begin to internalise morals but not question them.

Post-conventional morality includes stages:

Social Contract and Individual Rights – the individual realises that the laws put in by society are not always best for certain situations (e.g. euthanasia).

Universal Principles – the individual develops their own moral code that may or may not fit in with society's laws.

Kohlberg believed only a small percentage of people

would be capable of achieving this level of morality. This is the highest level of morality and involves an individual choosing their own principles to live by.

These stages derived from an experiment where they had to deal with a series of situations, and judged their reasons for the decisions they came to. This is one of the scenarios:

Heinz's wife was dying from a particular type of cancer. Doctors said a new drug might save her. The drug had been discovered by a local chemist and the Heinz tried desperately to buy some, but the chemist was charging ten times the money it cost to make the drug and this was much more than the Heinz could afford.

Heinz could only raise half the money, even after help from family and friends. He explained to the chemist that his wife was dying and asked if he could have the drug cheaper or pay the rest of the money later.

The chemist refused, saying that he had discovered the drug and was going to make money from it. The husband was desperate to save his wife, so later that night he broke into the chemist's and stole the drug.

Kohlberg then asked questions like: should Heinz have stolen the drug? Would it change anything if Heinz did not love his wife? What if the person dying was a stranger, would it make any difference? Should the police arrest the chemist for murder if the woman died?

The answers the participants came to reflected what type of morality each of them possessed. Those who believe Heinz did something wrong are considered to be in stages one and two; those who believe Heinz was right to steal the drug but should go to prison are considered to be in stages three and four; and those who believe Heinz was right to steal the drug but shouldn't go to prison are considered to be in stages five and six.

So, what do you think should happen to Heinz? Sadly, this isn't an answers on the back of a postcard forum, rather a time for you to think about what's right, what you would do and what that says about who you are.

POKEMON GONE

Since the summer we have all been subjected to the new mobile game craze, 'Pokémon Go'. A game where "you've gotta catch them all", or you have to hatch Pokémon in order to challenge tough gyms in your area so your team can rule dominant.

ANTHONY JOSHUA: THE RISE TO SUCCESS

Sammy Parkers looks at how Anthony Joshua, or AJ as he's now become known, has climbed the ranks of worldwide boxing in the last 4 years.

Back in 2012 when AJ won the Olympic gold medal in London, many people doubted whether he could turn pro. Joshua has proved them wrong. Since turning pro in 2013, Joshua has set the heavyweight division alight. 17 wins and 17 knock outs gives him one of the best records in world boxing today. But how did it all start for the champ? Was the local lad always set for success in the ring?

Born in Watford on the 15th October 1989, Joshua moved to Nigeria before returning to Garston when he was 11. Joshua excelled in sports such as football and athletics, but didn't begin to box until he turned 18. He began boxing at Finchley ABC in Barnet, which coincidently is also home to Dereck Chisora. In work, Joshua has the potential to make it to the top. 2009, Joshua won the Haringey Boxing Cup. He went on to retain it the following year. After only his 18th amateur bout, Joshua had the opportunity to turn pro with a hefty pay out of £50,000. Unsurprisingly, AJ declined the offer and it he claimed "Turning down that £50,000 was easy. I didn't take up the sport for money, I want to win medals." Certainly his desire for sporting greatness is something that seemed to inspire him to train harder, be fitter and get stronger.

AJ's hunger and desire to succeed paid off as he came second in the world amateur championships in Baku Azerbaijan, an improvement from the disappointing performance at the European Amateur Boxing Championships earlier that year. Joshua's success paid off as he was selected for team GB at the London Olympics in early 2012; at these Olympics, it really did seem as though the local boy could do no wrong.

Gold in London meant Joshua had to now turn pro to further improve his already impressive boxing career. So he did. Joshua took the heavyweight category by storm. No boxer could last more than a couple of rounds with Joshua. His record continues to amaze all boxing fans, especially his 100% knockout rate.

On the 9th of April 2016 Joshua went on to make history by defeating Charles Martin. Not only did he win the IBF Heavyweight title, but he also became the first person to hold both Olympic gold and a world championship at the same time.

So, where next for AJ? With big claims on him fighting the likes of David Haye, Wladimir Klitschko and maybe even Tyson Fury, Joshua has a real opportunity to make a legacy in the world of boxing. With machine-like power, electric speed and fancy foot-Whether he capitalises on his potential will be a different story, but the grit and determination shown by Joshua already suggests he will go the full way in his already mesmerising boxing career. And we can say, hand on heart, that he is a local lad, and we'll be watching in admiration.
