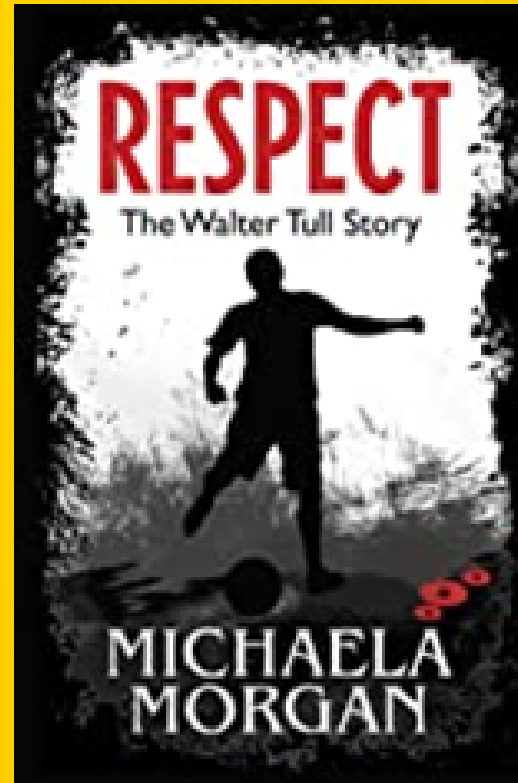


BOOKS OF VALUE

YEAR 6 into 7



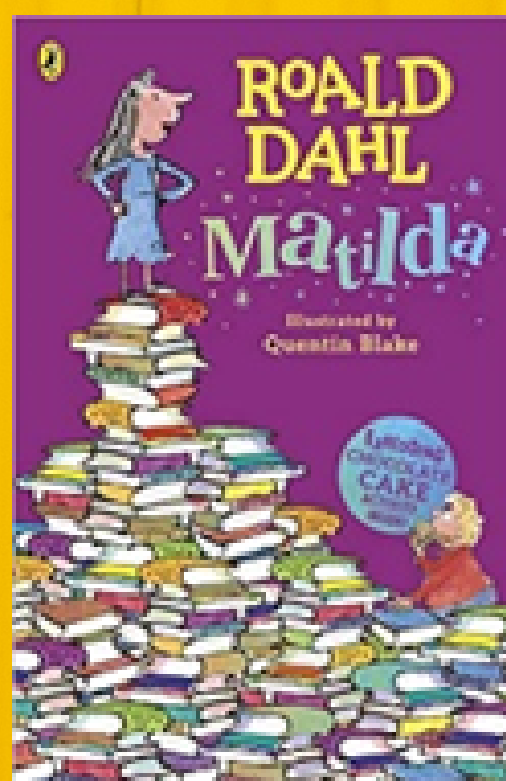
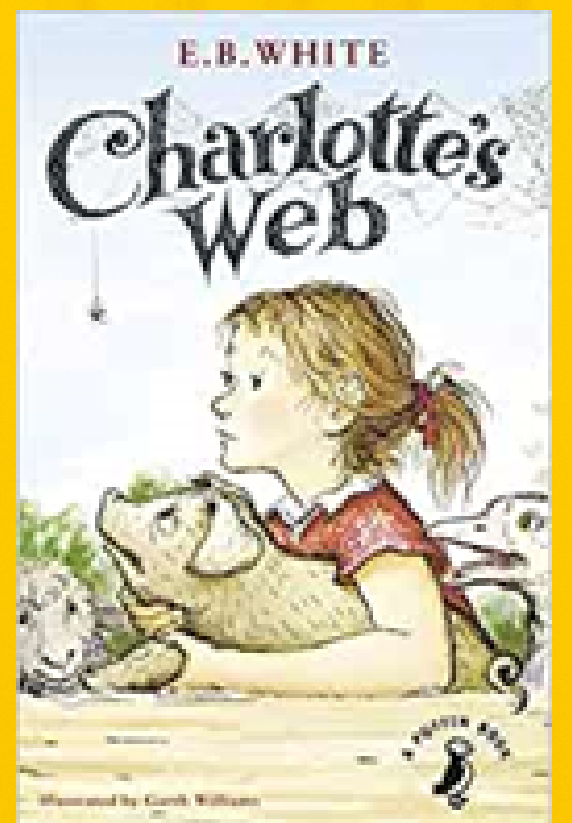
Based on the true story of Walter Tull, and his fight to be treated with **dignity** and respect as a Black British soldier and footballer during the First World War.



Auggie just wants to fit in at school despite his facial abnormality and be treated with **kindness** by his fellow students.



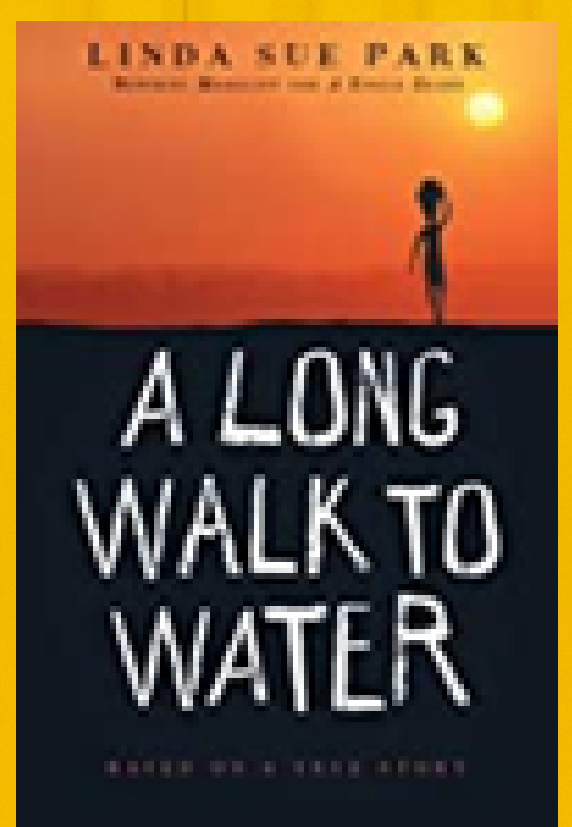
Wilbur the pig is shown **compassion** by Fern who saves him when he is born and Charlotte the spider who hatches an ingenious plan to keep him alive.

Salva, who is forced to flee his village on foot as a child, uses the determination gained by this **endeavour** to improve the lives of Nya, and others in her village, many years later.



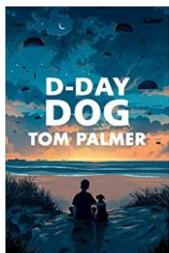
Suggestions for Year 6 into 7 students

A Pocketful of Stars by Aisha Bushby



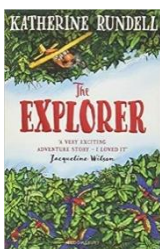

D-Day Dog by Tom Palmer – Winner of the Children's Book Award 2020



Jack can't wait for the school trip to the D-Day landing beaches. It's his chance to learn more about the war heroes he has always admired - brave men like his dad, who is a reserve soldier. But when his dad is called up to action and things at home spiral out of control, everything Jack believes about war is thrown into question. Finding comfort only in the presence of his loyal dog, Finn, Jack is drawn to the heart-wrenching true story of one particular D-Day paratrooper. On 6 June 1944, Emile Corteil parachuted into France with his dog, Glen - and Jack is determined to discover their fate ...

The Explorer by Katherine Rundell

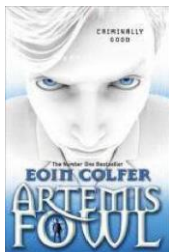


From his seat in the tiny aeroplane, Fred watches as the mysteries of the Amazon jungle pass by below him. He has always dreamed of becoming an explorer, of making history and of reading his name amongst the lists of great discoveries. If only he could land and look about him.

As the plane crashes into the canopy, Fred is suddenly left without a choice. He and the three other children may be alive, but the jungle is a vast, untamed place. With no hope of rescue, the chance of getting home feels impossibly small.

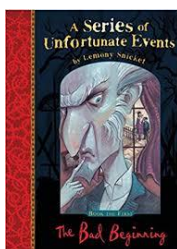
Except, it seems, someone has been there before them.

Artemis Fowl – Eoin Colfer



Twelve-year-old villain, Artemis Fowl, is the most ingenious criminal mastermind in history. His bold and daring plan is to hold a leprechaun to ransom. But he's taking on more than he bargained for when he kidnaps Captain Holly Short of the LEPrecon (Lower Elements Police Reconnaissance Unit). For a start, leprechaun technology is more advanced than our own. The Bad Beginning (A Series of Unfortunate Events) – Lemony Snicket



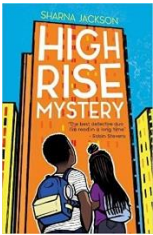
This book follows the turbulent lives of Violet, Klaus, and Sunny Baudelaire after their parents' death in an arsonous house fire. The children are placed in the custody of their distant cousin Count Olaf, who begins to abuse them and openly plots to embezzle their inheritance. After the Baudelaires are removed from his care by their parents' estate executor, Arthur Poe, Olaf begins to doggedly hunt the children down, bringing about the serial slaughter and demise of a multitude of characters.

The Graveyard Book – Neil Gaiman



When a baby escapes a murderer intent on killing the entire family, who would have thought it would find safety and security in the local graveyard? Brought up by the resident ghosts, ghouls and spectres, Bod has an eccentric childhood learning about life from the dead. But for Bod there is also the danger of the murderer still looking for him - after all, he is the last remaining member of the family. A stunningly original novel deftly constructed over eight chapters, featuring every second year of Bod's life, from babyhood to adolescence. Will Bod survive to be a man?

High-Rise Mystery by Sharna Jackson



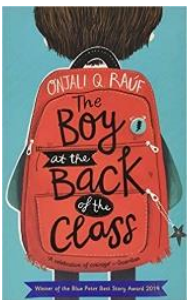

The Boy at the Back of the Class by Onjali Q Rauf



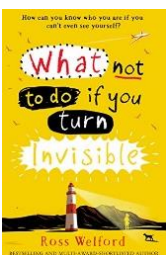
There used to be an empty chair at the back of my class, but now a new boy called Ahmet is sitting in it.

What not to do if You Turn Invisible by Ross Welford

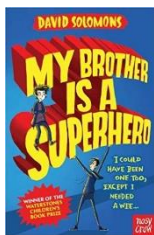

It's fun at first, being invisible. And aided by her friend Boydy, she manages to keep her extraordinary ability secret. Or does she...?

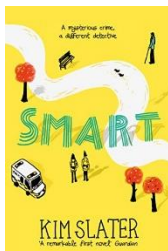

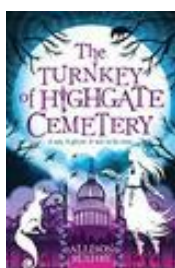
The Crossover by Kwame Alexander

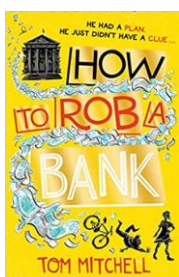

How to Rob a Bank by Tom Mitchell

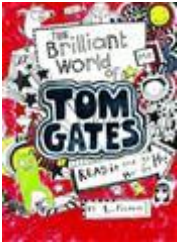

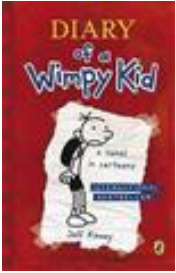

The Lost Diary of Sami Star



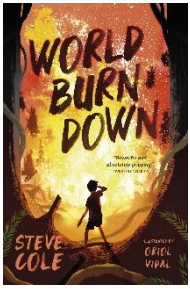
