D-Day Remembered

During the May half term 68 Year 8 students embarked on an amazing trip to France. "After waving goodbye to the white cliffs of Dover we were eager to get on to French soil and start our adventure. The first stop was at the Canadian memorial, Vimy Ridge, where the names of more than 11,000 Canadian soldiers who had fallen in WW1 were engraved in to stone. The monument is a beautiful tribute to the soldiers and a way of remembering the sacrifices they made in war. Walking around the memorial there was



a tranquillity that allowed us all to pay our own respects,



especially as we looked out on a landscape that had been transformed with the explosion of shells and trench warfare.

Our second day in France saw us help celebrate Astérix's 30th birthday with a day in Parc Astérix. The historic comic-based theme park was filled with unique and animated characters who ensured that even as you made your way from one ride to another you were entertained and your imagination captured. There really was something for everyone, with many thrilling rides and activities for the daredevils and some relaxing rides for those who don't enjoy the

adrenaline rush. We all agreed that 'Gaulois-Romains: Le Match', a comedic and acrobatic gladiator show, was strangely amazing. It didn't matter that we weren't fluent in French, the comedy and routines had us all (teachers included) clapping and cheering.



The trip was organised so that we had a mixture of activities, and our third day was spent exploring Château de Fontainebleau. The architecture dates back to the 1500s and the ornately decorated interior was a breath-taking example of French aristocratic history. The Château is a maze of rooms each and every one beautiful in their own way. The rest of the day was spent in the quaint medieval town of Provins. This rural town is



home to live jousting, roses and is a walled city.
