How do Lessons Link to Key Concepts



- In Year 9, skills are embedded and developed even further as students take on the challenge of GCSE.
 Emphasis is placed on studying a diverse range of texts from a variety of genres. E.g. students study a range of themed poetry and make selections in order to compare two poems. Students work on learning and retaining knowledge of set texts.
- In Year 10, skills taught at KS3 are embedded and developed even further as student's progress with the challenge of GCSE. Students continue to work on learning and retaining knowledge of set texts. Skills of synthesis and summarising are developed and students become more skilful at comparing non-fiction texts. Students are assessed on their ability to present ideas.
- In Year 11, we focus on revising key skills across all topic areas of the curriculum and students become more proficient at writing exam responses.
 Students also revise all topics.
