WHY?

The English Language Paper 1 is designed to improve and assess your ability to respond to a fictional text in an analytical and thoughtful way. The skills learned for this will help develop your analysis skills across your English GCSE (including the literature responses). Focusing on identifying information, analysing language, structure, opinion and creative writing will develop your ideas about works of fiction.

In the exam:

Q1 – 4 marks

Identify 4 things from the extract about...

Q2 – 8 marks

How does the writer use language to...

Q3 – 8 marks

How does the writer structure the text to interest you as a reader?

Q4 – 20 marks

Consider reasons for and against. What is your view? Why has the writer made you think that way? What techniques? MUST refer to author's methods.

Q5 – 40 marks

Creative Writing

Choice from two tasks. Describe and/or write a story. Choose carefully.

Tips and Tricks

Question 1: use full sentences focusing on the given topic ONLY. You may use statements and/or quotations

Question 2: focus on the language methods used by the writer. Consider the writer's reasoning and intent. Must refer to terminology accurately. *Adjective, adverb, simile, metaphor, pathetic fallacy, juxtaposition, oxymoron, personification, extended metaphor*

Question 3: focus only on structural devices. Must use the words SHIFT and FOCUS. Three paragraphs = beginning, middle & end.

Question 4: Consider reasons for and against. What is your view? Why has the writer made you think that way? What techniques? MUST refer to author's methods.

Question 5: Spend 5 minutes thinking and planning:

VFLAP the task:

Viewpoint – Who could you be? What is the narrative perspective? First person? Third person?

Form – What are you writing?

Language – What language is appropriate?

Audience – Who are you writing for? How will you add lines that suggest you know this?

Purpose – Why are you writing?

Consider an interesting perspective.

Think about your first line and first paragraph carefully!

Focusing on identifying information, analysing language, forming an opinion and functional writing will widen your ideas and concepts relating to real-life issues and topics.

Question 1: Read the article carefully.

Choose 4 statements which are true and shade the box. Be careful. Read between the lines.

Question 2: Write 3 paragraphs which focus on differences. Use quotes but do not analyse language. Make suggestions and inferences. Summary (simplify in own words + quotes+ inference)

Question 3: Focus on language and how it is used to describe the specific thing. Identify specific techniques and methods by name, use quotes, explain effects. Write 3-4 PETER paragraphs, linked together.

Question 4: Write a detailed answer. (1 x identify the feelings of both writers, 3 x write about what the feelings are in depth, referring to writer's methods, compare the feelings, 1 x conclusion) Make sure you have at least two quotations in each paragraph.

Question 5: Spend 5 minutes thinking and planning:

Viewpoint – What do you think about the topic?

What is your opinion?

Form – What are you writing?

Language – What language is appropriate?

Audience – Who are you writing for? How will you add lines that suggest you know this?
