How do Lessons Link to Key Concepts



- Analysing the causes of historical events, for example the Anglo-Spanish War. Untangling a range of economic, social, cultural, religious, and political factors.
- Evaluating the importance of causes in lessons after studying the content.
- Explaining and evaluating the shortterm and long-term significance of events and people. For example, Edward Jenner's smallpox vaccine.
- Putting key events into chronological order.
- Skills lessons focus on analysing provenance, evaluating interpretations, and engaging in historical debates using evidence.
- Understanding the complexities of societies, for example social class in the 19th century.

Retrieval Practice Opportunities / Supporting Ways to Help us Remember



- Regular knowledge assessments recalling past information.
- Spaced learning exercises every term during lessons, including mind maps and mind dumps.
- Extra revision sessions every week after school.
- Easter revision and Year 11 revision time.
- Starter activities at the beginning of every lesson to recap prior content.

- Students are given reading to do in class.

Opportunities for Assessing Learning



- Students will have regular exam questions marked and analysed with written and/or verbal feedback per year.
- Students will be asked to record targets for their benefit and future use.
- Students will also peer assess each other's work and get to know the mark scheme well.
- Model answers are also used to help improve understanding of the mark scheme and how to improve.
