We also had 21 Year 10 students join the trip on the second day for a practice walk to experience carrying a pack loaded with everything they will need for the Year 10 qualifying expedition which will take place on Saturday 10th - Sunday 11th July.
















House Competition


Robotics Webinar

We were invited to participate in a webinar delivered by the University of Cambridge last week about The Future of Robotics and seven of our Year 9 students participated. There was a focus on the meaning of intelligence, machine learning and the importance of the design of physical structures. We got to hear from a panel of leading experts and students in the field, and were shown some cutting edge research in robotics and



heard about how robotics can be used to solve the pressing challenges of the future. We had the opportunity at the end to try to "program" paper by cutting it into different shapes, to try to make it fall in certain





patterns.

A Level Maths in Action Workshop


A group of A Level Maths students joined in on the Maths in Action Workshop where we heard from several dynamic speakers on important topics relating current events to maths. Sara Jabbari spoke about Fighting Disease with Mathematics and described the way mathematics can be used to understand antibiotic resistance, track the dynamics of bacterial infections and even develop new drugs to tackle disease. Bobby Seagull, Secondary Mathematics teacher and doctoral candidate shared who would make his mathematics dream team for University Challenge. Vicky Neale led an interactive workshop on counting factors where we explored

some questions from the area of maths called number theory. Paul Harrison, better known as The Singing Hedgehog, spoke about preparations for examinations. Alex Bellos, author and broadcaster led a session jampacked with puzzles, demonstrations and mathematical conundrums. And Michael Blastland wrapped up the day with Bad Stats: What They Don't Tell You on the



News which gave students skills for spotting bad-news and bad-science used by the media.





Accelerated Reader Word Millionaires



All students in Years 7, 8 and 9 are enrolled in a reading scheme called Accelerated Reader. Students take a comprehension test to assess their reading ability and this helps to guide them to select appropriate reading material. When students finish a book on the scheme they can take a short online quiz to check their understanding of what they have read. Students earn house points for each quiz that they pass.

We now have 6 new Accelerated Reader Word Millionaires! These students have read over one million words since September.

Oliver Tomlins 7VL is in 7th place with 1,457,813 words read.


Jessica Bonnin 9FD is in 8th place with 1,295,556 words read.

activities which will serve them well in applying a 'Practitioner' to their devised performance



work over the course of this term.
Students were encouraged to think
about the use of the key 'ingredients' of
theatre-making for the company, which
includes use of verbatim style text
delivery, character and narrative,
movement, exposing the method and
motif. In pairs and groups, students
were encouraged to make use of a range
of resources, including 'character cards'
and their own writing and character

observations of each other, to deliver short, improvised, and devised scenes, movement pieces and narrated text. Apart from the occasional collapse into a fit of giggles, the range of talent and skill on display was both impressive as it was encouraging. All the students gained an immense amount from working with a professional company I look forward to seeing the result of this in their final devised performances towards the end of the term.

The sculpture has been sprayed with Snowcem, an exterior masonry paint, to protect it from the elements and had a new steel plate fixed to the bottom.








Eid al Fitr




The Big Read 2021


Celebrating Diwali at Marlborough

Greece Trip, February 2020

We then ventured to the more mountainous region of ancient **Delphi**, which the ancient Greeks considered to be the centre of the world and the home of the oracle. Another highlight was visiting **Olympia**, where the original Olympic Games originated. 
















Celebrating Black History Month

Mrs Wood also produced this <u>Sway</u> explaining the origins of Black History Month and providing some links to other websites with further information








