Prize Giving at the Abbey



It was anything but Grimm!





The second hand book sale proved popular with staff and students and is something we plan to repeat in the summer term.




This half term Mrs Day's Year 7 classes have been creating performances based on Ali Sparkes book Car-Jacked our Big Read this year.




First they had to read their chapter of the story and highlight any moments of direct speech, which then formed the starting point of their script.







This Year's LIFE Project, (Local Intervention Fire Education) was held from Monday 27th to Friday 31st January at St. Albans Fire Station. Students from Year 8 joined the Fire Service for the week. The LIFE project is an interactive experience for students who have faced challenges to learn transferable skills through firefighting activities.

Specially trained Fire Fighters deliver the LIFE project; it is an intensive five-day work experience course in a disciplined and well-focused environment. With the help of the friendly



trainers, the students learnt the job of a real firefighter through taking part in a range of activities that included using ladders, breathing apparatus equipment, and learning casualty rescue techniques.



There were some classroom sessions too where the students learnt about social responsibility, and how different behaviours can impact on the community, their families and themselves with the intention of getting them to adopt a new set of values and understand the consequences of their behaviour and the choices they make in everyday situations. By the end of the week the students had gained resilience, self-esteem, confidence and the ability to improve their life skills.

All our students successfully completed the course and received an AQA accredited certificate from John Boulter, Head of Protection, Herts County Council at an official Passing Out Parade attended by parents, carers and families of the students. Well done to all our students who participated!




St Albans Schools Book Award

Students were able to buy copies of Lisa's books and have them signed including her most recent book The Boy Who Fooled the World which isn't officially published until next month.





We insist on all parents and students signing up to our policies and each year all of our students must successfully complete four bespoke online safety modules, as an insurance that they know the laws, dangers and what to do if they have any concerns. We have as a leadership team seen mobile phones used in some exceptionally creative ways to support learning but there are too areas of the school where mobile phones are not allowed.

Our system works for us – communications have improved considerably – and why would we ban something that has become a huge part of modern life without helping our children navigate their way through the perils?

Year 7 Classics Game Changer Day

This Game Changer day on Monday 4th November launched us into the second half of this term. Each student was given the same resource and demonstrated a unique ability to absorb information, transferring this into their own work.





The students were excited to carve their Latin names on the clay tablet supplied. Despite the practicalities of using the Latin alphabet to translate their names, this was a challenge nonetheless enjoyed.

After break the students were asked to research a particular myth writing numerous facts and replicating the myth by drawing it on a vase. Students began by exploring the architecture and how it represented the afterlife. This task focused on cultural memory. It seemed more appropriate as this day fell on Remembrance Day.

As well as being able to translate pictorially the image on to the surface of a vase students completed an extended piece of writing in the form of a diary.





The final task of the day allowed further research of the Ancient Greek philosophers.

Students were asked to find out at least ten facts about three or more philosophers of Ancient Greece and then develop their findings into journalistic writing.

Drama Game Changer Day - The National Theatre

On Thursday 14th November, 30 Year 9 and 10 students visited The National Theatre for a backstage tour and a workshop. Not only were the students able to sit in two of the National's theatres, The Lyttelton and The Dorfman, they also visited the set design workshop areas were they could see designers working on projects for upcoming shows. Our guides for the tour were very knowledgeable about the theatre's history and the various jobs their staff of around 1000 people



do. The day gave students an idea of some of the job roles in the theatre industry beyond actors and directors.



After lunch the students met one of the set designers from The National Theatre who talked to them about how a design idea gets from sketch to stage. One aspect of this is model boxes, the students were set the brief of designing a model box set for Alice In Wonderland, adapted to be set in a world inspired by a game of their choice.

The students were really creative with designs inspired by Minecraft, Tetris, Connect 4, The Sims, Fifa and Piano Tiles, to name just a few.

Year 9 Game Changer Day - The Beauty of Maths



A group of year 9 students spent the day exploring all things maths. We started by looking at patterns in numbers and discovered ways to determine divisibility

of a number and even how to multiply very large numbers in our heads!

The second half of the day had us looking at codebreaking. We started with Caesar Ciphers one of the simplest and most widely known encryption techniques named after Julius Caesar, who used it in his private correspondence. Students then found out that a monoalphabetic cipher like this has four hundred septillion (400 000 000 000 000 000 000 000) different possible combinations of solutions. We then learnt about frequency analysis to discover tricks on how to crack these.



Our day ended with a study of Enigma machines. We were fortunate enough to have Mr



Fitzsimmons leading through our discoveries and he shared a digital programme that allowed us to manipulate all the parts of Enigma machines just as they did during World War II.

It really was an exceptional day and I hope students remain as excited about their knowledge as when they left at the end of the school day.

The event proved to be a really enjoyable conclusion to our study of 'Romeo and Juliet'.



Endeavouring to enrich the curriculum for all and introduce another way to help Year 11 students to prepare for the PPEs in November The Globe Players went on to deliver a 60 minute version of 'An Inspector Calls' transporting students to the fictional town of Brumley. Again, the players explored the themes and characters, motivations and plot structures, in an abridged version of the whodunit mystery. 
