## **English and Photography ACES Day**

'Nature: in all its glory' was the title of the workshop for Year 8 and 9 ACES students last week. The morning was organised by Ms Redfern and Ms Burton who had arranged for Mr Rupert Evershed, a nature writer for the Herts Advertiser, to come in to school and not only talk to the students but help them craft a piece of non-fiction nature writing inspired by the natural landscape of The Marlborough Science Academy.

After a chance meeting with the editor of the Herts Advertiser at a Literary Festival two years ago Mr Evershed mentioned that our local newspaper did not have a nature column like many of the daily newspapers. This was the start of the Nature Notes articles which now appears in the Herts Advertiser. Mr Evershed's articles are always relevant to the local area and are accompanied by an equally insightful photograph. Although Mr Evershed's hobby is bird watching he also has a keen interest in anything to do with nature and the environment around us. He spoke to the students about how we should all observe what nature there is around us, how to employ all of our senses and sometimes even a sixth sense which can be affected by the weather, season or time of day.

The students brief was to go out and take a photo and then write an article about their picture. After being given some photography tips by Ms Burton, about not just getting eye level shots but getting in close and framing their shots the students were able to explore our site in a very different way. Although Storm Doris was threatening, the students captured some amazing photographs and some even caught a glimpse of blue sky before regrouping to write their article. Ms Redfern and Mr Evershed were on hand to help assist and ensure their written pieces were as beautifully crafted as their photographs.



Over recent years, there has been a recognition of the importance of developing language and communication skills as integral to all aspects of learning and the curriculum. As part of the overall SEND strategy review, the Local Authority is reviewing the current arrangements in Hertfordshire for meeting speech, language and communication needs (SLCN). A workstream has been set up with representation from schools, parents and specialist staff to review the range of support and provision required to help achieve the best outcomes for children and young people with SLCN.


