trying a new food called a Flam which was strange but highly enjoyable. In total, my trip to Lille was one of my most enjoyable trips ever.' James Genchi






ACES Standard Stickers

To encourage our students to continue working to their very highest standards and to exemplify work of a high standard we will be introducing ACES Standard marking stickers (to run in conjunction with House Points and Pinkies) across all faculties in January. These will be awarded for to students for work which meets the ACES criteria for each subject area. They can be awarded to students who are already identified as gifted and talented in a particular subject, or to students who are meeting some of the ACES criteria.

In order to highlight some of the higher level learning which is going on across the school we have uploaded some 'ACES Standard' work to the ACES page of the school website.






Just before the Christmas holidays each member of our teaching staff were hand delivered an envelope each containing a secret teaching and learning mission card (activity to run). Staff were then challenged to incorporate their mission into one or more of their lessons.

Once the mission had been put into operation, staff then forwarded their write up of what they had done, along with any photos of the work undertaken.


All missions were randomly assigned to staff so nobody knew who had what activity. Prizes were also secretly dispatched to staff.

Miss Fogarty's Year 7 class were allowed to design their own activity. They came up with the idea of filing a top secret report for the British Government. They are currently studying the witches by Ronald Dahl and they decided to create an activity in which they were the grandmother (who is a witchofile and knows how to spot a witch). They had to compile a report retrieving information from the text on how to spot a witch and write a formal report. They then came up with their own success criteria which they used to SA their work. They then completed a full self- assessment of their work.

Student were all strung together by tying the string round their hand, they were connected together in 7 rows and 4 columns, he then used the picture as a stimulus for discussing the questions written on the picture slides. Students then held yellow and red cards to model positive and negative charges. Holding yellow cards are carrying negative charges while the red cards carry positive charges. Finally his students then wrote extensive explanations about what they had learnt



Marlborough Lodge







SMSC at Marlborough - Reflection books


Within form time at Marlborough we like to use the time productively and each morning have an activity for our students to take part in.


One of these activities is completing their Reflection Theme booklets, where each week the theme is different and the students are asked for their thoughts and opinions on a variety of subjects.

Andalucia 2017

Early on the 13th December, Spanish students were bravely huddled against the all consuming dark and cold of the school car park- awaiting our 'get-a-way vehicle' to whisk us off to sunny Andalucía. Having left the sludgy remains of week-old snow, we received a surprisingly warm welcome of 20°C heat.

Our schedule each day was packed to the point of bursting; after our 8:00 am breakfast each day we hardly seemed to stop for a breather. The great diversity of trips and visits kept us on our toes. Even on the first day we visited the Alcazaba fortress in Màlaga, saw an amphitheatre, did Christmas shopping, saw the light display, ate tapas ...and these weren't even the main events of our trip. Each day there was something for everyone; personally I enjoyed the historical sites we visited. The Cathedral-Mosque of Córdoba was not only a breathtaking cultural experience, but we learnt more about Spain's chequered history of conquest, and had the opportunity to question our guides- in Spanish!


For many, I'm sure the highlight was visiting the secondary school. I'm sure all of us have imagined and wondered what life might be like in another town, or school, or country- and we got to experience just that. Honestly, I was slightly nervous about this visit, but we soon all got into the swing of it. After playing some ice-breaker games (for it seems we were all quite nervous), we got a chance to talk to the students, practising our Spanish as we shared our interests, opinions and jokes. We made some invaluable connections and due to the wonders of modern day technology, many of us are still in touch - especially if liking a post on Instagram counts as 'being in touch'. Obviously, we didn't just travel 1,440.6 miles for fun and games though. After a recuperating sleep on the first night, we started our lessons at 'Escuela la Playa'- and my group was lucky enough to have its lessons outside, basking in the morning sunshine, right by the beach. The St Albans and Harpenden foodbank staff were overwhelmed and truly grateful of the generosity shown by staff and students of The Marlborough Science Academy.




A Level Art


