


Teaching and Learning at Marlborough

As part of every Tuesday's staff briefing I disseminate different teaching and learning ideas as well as passing on resources or lesson activities created by staff.

Miss Fogarty recently turned her English lesson into a literacy themed restaurant. She got her students to be involved in a book tasting and turned S5 into a restaurant with a flickering fire and ambient music playing in the background. Students had 10 books to choose from but had to choose their book based on the first line - which were placed on a specially designed menu. Students then read a new book and tried a different genre. Once they were finished they completed a mini book review. I am sure her students will remember this for a long time.





Another way we disseminate good practice and ensure high quality learning is to conduct learning reviews where members of the leadership team visit lessons to look at how our students are learning, talk to them and look at their books. We recently reviewed Post 16 provision with the following comments shared below:

English

- Lovely atmosphere good engagement, good level of debate, great engagement and great one to one.
- Great subject knowledge

Maths

- Revision lesson. 2 colour coded questions, students making revision maps which they found useful. Colour coding key parts. Worked examples provided, excellent climate for learning.
- Excellent climate for learning. Students participating well, asking questions to clarify any misconceptions they had. Clear worked examples, students helping each other. Great student knowledge.
- Excellent climate for learning, lots of questions asked, good neat notes made, clear explanations.
- Behaviour for learning is great. Use of My Maths to check learning, instructions and explanations clear.
- Excellent climate for learning even with a change of classroom. Difficult question on board, problem broken down into 3 help sections with worked through solutions. Students then given time to answer a question, all but 1 got it right. Good use of students to support the one who made an error.

Teaching and Learning continued

Science

- Excellent planning and well executed practical lessons. Clear plan of the lesson. Lots of feedback in the books.
- Clear explanations, general recall questions being asked at the start of the lesson. Assessment recently completed and marked. Specific questions given to individuals - pushed students further. Good pace. Note books are acknowledged marked.
- Regular feedback, mainly stamp used; students' green pen responses. Clear assessment criteria shown and highlighted. Good parts highlighting, clear routine for responding to feedback. Behaviour for learning excellent. Student test stuck in books for todays' lesson. Assessment sheet well marked.
- All students engaged. Lots of clear detailed notes with feedback from teacher.
- Clear resources being used on the PowerPoint. Student notes are clear well presented students working in exercise books marking with extension/NOW tasks seen.
- Books show evidence of marking. Clear explanations of key weaknesses in exams.
- Excellent climate for learning. Excellent questioning and student responses. Target sheet completed and well above target, well organised learning. Everything relating and linking to learning objective. Superb learning.

Humanities

- Fantastic engagement. Great feedback from teacher, very detailed. Targets are long term and to be included in the next essay so no evidence of green pen but still clear progress.
- Clear structure, students researched different aspects ready to do presentations in the second lesson. Students work with books or folders so work kept together. Good question and answer section.
- Clear task for student on globalisation students using two articles to consider the pros and cons. General notes are not marked but student books include two more formal assessments including on more recently.
- Detailed feedback for students on first coursework draft level and tick lists, improvements.
- Engagement/preparation/relationships. File was well organised, evidence of assessments and feedback.
- Great pace, dynamic teaching, strong subject knowledge. Assessments marked well, excellent demonstration using props, great student contributions.

ICT

- Revision lesson for the PPEs students are clear about what is to be tested in the PPE, summary exercise building to a matching exercise to identify key areas ideas. All students report that they complete exercises using questions from past papers. Notes checked each lesson.
- Students keeping learning journal of work completed including S/A. Students responding to test marking to increase scores to full marks for each question.
- Clearly going through exam assessment criteria with the group, all displayed on student scores, key words displayed giving examples for students. Turned assessment criteria into clear questions students could ask about their work. Used google classroom to show previous evaluations to support the lesson. Google classroom shows the students work with clear staff responses that can be accessed from anywhere. Students get nearly instant feedback which they like and you can track and amendments made. Behaviour for learning was excellent.

• Incredible, innovative teaching methods, expert questioning, strong feedback.

Business

• Excellent climate for learning. Highly organised, excellent resources, starter packs, students choosing at different levels. Mark schemes used, clear success criteria and self-assessing. First Day Calls

BBC News last week featured the tragic story of teacher, Helen Daykin. In October 2016, Helen was working away from home when her husband, Chris, died suddenly whilst looking after their young children. After his sudden death from heart failure in the house, Helen's little girls, four and two, spent almost 24 hours with the body of their father.

The older girl had recently started school, and when she didn't arrive, the school rang their father, to no avail. Tragically, they didn't then follow up with a call to the girls' mother, 200 miles away in London. The alarm wasn't raised until tea-time when Chris' mother visited the home.

Helen is telling her heart-breaking story to raise awareness of the importance of first-day calls, and the importance of responding to school if contacted. With this in mind I thought it would be useful to remind everybody of what we do to help safeguard our community.

Dear Parent,

I am writing to make you aware of the school procedure for children who have unexplained absences from school. There have been public cases in the past where schools have not chased up the reasons as to why children are off of school. It has then transpired that there have been tragic circumstances around these absences, e.g. illness of a parent and a child unable to seek help. We will do everything we can to prevent such situations occurring as I am sure you would agree that your child's safety is paramount to us all.

If your child is not going to be in school please call the office on 01727 731368 or email the school on attendance@marlborough.herts.sch.uk to report their absence. Please do this before 08:30 on the first day of the absence.

If we have not heard from you by 09:15am, then we will start to send school comms text messages and emails and call all the contact numbers that you have provided in order to gain an explanation for the absence. If we still have not been able to ascertain where your child is then we may well make a home visit. However if we still haven't been able to get a response then we will report it to the police as your child will then be classed a 'missing child'.

This procedure is to ensure that we know where your child is and that you are all safe. Please let us know in good time why your child is absent from school. If you would like to talk to me about this please make an appointment to see me.

The Marlborough Science Academy First Day Call Procedure

- Registers taken promptly.
- Attendance team listen to absence calls, read absence emails and check school comms messages.
- Registers collated, lates, absence calls produce the list of children absent with no explanation (these will be N marks on SIMS).
- Any discrepancies will be chased up in school.
- Send school comms (texts and emails), if no response start first day calling for children absent without explanation, call everyone on the contact list until you get an answer. Leave messages if there is a voicemail option.
- If an overseas ring tone, a check is made with DoLs and the Head teacher to see if there has been any contact for holiday authorisation.
- If no replies at all consider whether any children have additional agency support, such as a social worker, contact them.
- Speak to any family members in school to ask about the child's whereabouts.
- Call the contact list at least twice and send out another set of school comms at PM registration if we have not had any communication.
- Make a prompt home visit if we have concerns.
- If you cannot get an answer from the home visit refer to children's services / MASH / Police and request a welfare call.

Holocaust Memorial Day

Saturday 27th January saw Holocaust Memorial Day being commemorated across the globe. This date was chosen as it was the date on which Auschwitz, the most infamous concentration camp, was liberated. Holocaust Memorial Day is the day used to remember the 17 million people, including 6 million Jews, murdered during the genocide from approximately 1933 – 1945.

Here at Marlborough, we remembered the victims of the Holocaust and subsequent genocides including Rwanda, Srebrenica, Cambodia and Darfur during our school assemblies. Our Year 10 History students also took part in the Holocaust Educational Trust's annual Survivor Testimony Webcast. They saw Holocaust survivor Janine Webber tell her story, which included having to hide in a hole dug under a wardrobe, as well as the loss of her father, brother and mother to the cruel Nazi regime.



Goalmapping was a particularly interesting way of showing the students how to break down texts full of facts into an easier way of remembering the information.







Learning Counts

Every Friday tutor time a member of the Senior management team meets with a selection of students from Years 7-11, Ms Thomson meets with Year 7s to ensure transition is successful and other year groups meet with their SLT link. The sole purpose of these meetings is to ensure that students feel they have a voice, that they can talk about anything and that we can understand how their learning is going. We feedback to staff all the positive comments and action any areas of concern. We are rigorous in ensuring students know how to keep themselves safe online.

Student Achievements

There have been some amazing swimming achievements by **Daniel Martin 10BS** and **Matthew Martin 8NS**. They both swim for City of St Albans Swimming Club (CoStA) and have done since the ages of 7 and 9.



Over the weekends of 13/14 and 20/21 January they competed in Hertfordshire County Swimming Championships. The competition has an age and qualification time that they need to meet in order to qualify and only the fastest 24 entrants in Hertfordshire can compete.

Dan chose to compete in 8 of the events that he qualified for and made all 8 finals, finishing 3rd in the 100m and 200m freestyle and winning a bronze medal for each. He finished 4th in the 100IM narrowly missing out on a medal.

Matthew chose to compete in 7 of the events that he qualified for and finished 5th in the 200IM and made the top 10 and top 15 in his other races. A fantastic achievement for them both in a tough competition with the best swimmers in Hertfordshire.



Rhianna Patel 8PP and Nikhil Patel 7RY both attended the World Taekwondo Europe Presidential European Cup in Stuttgart, Germany last weekend. There were over 300 teams taking part from all over Europe. This was Nikhil's 1st tournament at the cadet level, he had 40 competitors in his category.
