
During Book Week there is a quiz running in the LRC for students to guess which member of staff is behind the book.




News from the Art Department

A Survivor's Story: Holocaust Memorial Visit

On a blustery and dark February morning Miss Fogarty took a group of students to Northwood Synagogue to learn about the Holocaust. Students were greeted warmly by the members of the synagogue and its resident Rabbi. During the introduction, students were encouraged to consider how the lessons from the Holocaust still remain unlearnt as genocide continues to occur throughout the world.

With this still fresh in their minds, the students were split into groups and participated in workshops in order to gain an insight to life of Jewish person in Nazi occupied Europe.

However, the real privilege was when a Holocaust survivor (Harry Olmer) spoke to the students about his experiences of the war and how he managed to survive one of the worst human atrocities ever seen. Harry was born 15th of November, 1927 in a small town in Poland. He was one of six children yet, only three (including himself) survived the Holocaust. Harry survived not only one, but three concentrations camps and numerous work assignments.

When he was liberated from Theresienstadt in 1945 he was brought to England where he studied in Glasgow before becoming a qualified dentist in 1953.

It was a truly humbling moment as the students understood that they would be one of the last generations to ever hear a survivor's testimonial.



The Marlborough Science Academy First Day Absence Call Procedure

- Registers taken promptly.
- Attendance team listen to absence calls, read absence emails and check school comms messages.
- Registers collated, lates, absence calls produce the list of children absent with no explanation (these will be N marks on SIMS).
- Any discrepancies will be chased up in school.
- Send school comms (texts and emails), if no response start first day calling for children absent without explanation, call everyone on the contact list until you get an answer. Leave messages if there is a voicemail option.
- If an overseas ring tone, a check is made with DoLs and the Head teacher to see if there has been any contact for holiday authorisation.
- If no replies at all consider whether any children have additional agency support, such as a social worker, contact them.
- Speak to any family members in school to ask about the child's whereabouts.
- Call the contact list at least twice and send out another set of school comms at PM registration if we have not had any communication.
- Make a prompt home visit if we have concerns.
- If you cannot get an answer from the home visit refer to children's services / MASH / Police and request a welfare call.

Finance Office

The Finance Office is currently experiencing a high volume of students asking for hand written receipts for revision guides that have paid for via School Gateway.

Please may we request that you print off payment confirmations wherever possible so that your child can show these directly to their subject teacher – they will then be given the relevant books.

Payment confirmations can be accessed by logging into your School Gateway account and clicking into the Payment History section. Every transaction will be displayed and by clicking into a transaction it will then show a breakdown of what that particular payment covers.

Your child can then either take a photo on their phone (if they have one) or you can print this information by right- clicking and choosing the print option.

E-safety message from a Year 7 student

Keep your things to yourself

It is very important that you keep yourself safe whilst you are on your electronic devices. There is a very clear line between the do's and don'ts and it is very important that you stay safe when playing – especially online or with anonymous players. You must be aware of what you are doing when going on a gadget, so here are some examples of what to be mindful of.

- Don't share inappropriate parts of your body on social media
- Don't share anything with people you don't know
- Personal pictures are no longer yours once they have been spread across social media
- Keep your settings on private
- Your private information should stay that way private
- Strangers should not be speaking to you, so do not speak to them

Inappropriate pictures, private information and strangers can get you into all sorts of trouble, which is never a good thing at all. It's okay to make mistakes, but it is even better if you don't create them in the first place.

You should always be aware of what you are taking a photo of. It could be rude, inappropriate, embarrassing, mean, revealing, unsafe, sexting and so on. You must get permission to send pictures of other people, let alone taking the picture in the first place. Did you know that sexting is illegal? You could go to jail for it. So many people get tricked into posting revealing images to unknown users, and can get tied into doing things that embarrass them or scare them.

Your private information is yours to keep and not to share. It is so dangerous to show things like where you go to school, if your parents are at home, where you live, and so much more. People will know where you go and where you are if your location settings are on. It's perfectly fine if you're sending your location to just some friends, but it is silly to show it publicly. If you send something online, it's going to stay there forever, so if you post locations of where you live, go to school or hang out, anyone could see it at all times, not just those on your contacts.

Strangers are sometimes lovely people and are sometimes the person that you wish you never met, for all the negative reasons. Unless you know this person face to face, it is most likely a childish idea to say hello and have a chat. Sometimes you don't even know this person, you might just know them from another friend's cousin's grandpa's daughter's son. The line of relationship can get very difficult. This person might be related to a close friend and might be nice to them, but that doesn't mean that they'll be the same around you. Just because one person knows them from some place else, doesn't mean you should accept them right away. I'm not suggesting that from here on you shut everyone out it they're related to a friend, but you just have to be aware.
