Shining at the Shine School Media Awards 2018



The Shine School Media Awards is a national competition rewarding UK secondary schools who produce an outstanding newspaper, magazine, podcast or website.

For the third year running *The Mo* magazine was nominated for a series of prizes in The Shine School Media Awards. This year the magazine was shortlisted for: Best Original Artwork; Best Photograph; Best Cartoon and Most Inspirational Teacher.

The finals were attended by Ms Redfern, Joe Vahed, Daniel Howell and Elise Wylie on 2nd July 2018 at Stationer's Hall in London (home for writers for the last 600 years). Prior to the prize ceremony the 150 students were invited to participate in a range of different workshops including everything from: setting up your own digital publishing house; animation; how to be the next Google; the wonders of 3D printing as well as workshops from leading Young Adult fiction writers.

Annie Hotton, the chair of the Shine Awards, commented on how strong the competition was with this year with entry levels for each category increasing and the overall standards getting better and better. Therefore, to come away with two Highly Commended certificates (one for Best Animation and one for Most Inspirational Teacher) is impressive. Judges commented that Kate Mercer's animation, 'What a Waste', was "a great drawing that showed the plight of wildlife caused by plastic... a clever way to put across such an awful message with humour".

On 30th June The Marlborough Science Academy hosted a Science and Art day for Year 5 students from Prae Wood School.

Students joined Science's Mr Eve and Mr Milne to extract DNA from strawberries in an experiment that one student said was "really brilliant... the DNA looked so gloopy!". Later in the day they even set about extracting colour pigment from spinach leaves. The student's day of botany continued for the students with Ms Bustin and Ms Rickman; after gathering a range of textured leaves, flowers and twigs students designed their own clay molds using their finds for an impression. Once they were happy with their design plaster was used to create a tile that they could take home. Each student left the school smiling, raving about how much they had learned and how they couldn't wait to come back!

The fun didn't stop there for Prae Wood students, as those Year 5s who couldn't attend were treated to a code-cracking maths masterclass with Miss Sutton and three of her ACES students before finishing their day with Miss Fox and some of her dance troupe on a piece inspired by The Greatest Showman!


School Uniform

The following Marlborough students took part in a two day transition programme with the Year 6s at Prae Wood Primary School. On day one the focus was Friendships, Peer Pressures and Social Media. The session began with a drama warmup followed by a small performance of a worst case scenario in a forum theatre style. The audience had to interact with the performance and change the outcome of the story. The students were then split up and worked with a pair of our students to help them create their own stories. These performances were based on one of the key words of that day. Each group then took turns to perform to their peers and gave a final word of what the moral of their story was.

On the second day the focus was a different theme. We looked at Organisation, Resilience and Confidence. The workshop continued with the same plan as the day before. The TMSA Cup





Year 9 Maths

Following two days of Insight into Industry and given the industrial heat in the classroom, Mrs Greenwood thought it might be useful to see which maths skills transfer into games; and which games might support maths skills. Also, with the continued rise of technology, she finds that fewer students know the packs of cards and the accompanying language while probability questions still teem with such references. They played each game for 15 minutes then changed. They played shapes Top Tumps (with the fact that stadium is an actual shape and the venue named for the shape, quite a revelation to some!); a board game akin to Scrabble in which you must create and solve equations; playing Snap to see the different suits and the groups were matched to ensure that each had someone who could talk cards; and a fantastic estimating game because too often students believe that in Maths there must always be a correct answer. There were also dominoes, both traditional and fraction/decimal types. The class clearly enjoyed their games, which was a nice way to spend the last - and possibly hottest Maths lesson of the week.



Year 10 Textiles

Here's a showcase of the Year 10 Textiles Practical Exam. Students were given the brief of 'Natural Forms' as the theme and were free to design and make/embellish a garment within a 10 hour deadline.

Grace Parkins excelled herself with a decorative corset embellished with a fan attachment, free motion embroidery peacock feathers and a tulle shirt.

Hannah Evershed created not only one but two outfits for a child in the tight deadline in which she created a hand painted print decoration and hand embroidery inspired by 'Oranges and Lemons'.
