

#### Good Luck to Year 11



# **Penny Joelson Visit**





Creativity is highly sought after in today's rather uncertain economic climate as well as being a key element within the global workplace. With so many talented students sharing their


ideas, it is clear that they will go into the world of work

Nikhil battled his way to the final and earned himself a well deserved silver medal against a skilful opponent.


All three continue to work hard and have learnt from their experience in the competition to improve their skills for the next tournament.

#### **Student Achievement**

Oliver Tarvet—10LT recently qualified for the International Tennis Federation's J4 Tournament in Nottingham. Here is what Oliver had to say about his experience.

'On the morning before the tournament I went up to Nottingham to get some practice in and adjust to the court and conditions. I had recently returned from training camp in Spain so I was feeling generally confident about my rhythm and ability.

On the day of the tournament I was feeling good after a short practice in the morning. At 2pm I was called to play, my opponent was a strong British player so I was ready for a tough match! I



started well and clinched the first set 6-4 and I was ready to keep going. However, he increased the intensity of his tactics and I lost the second set 3-6. I knew that if I wanted to succeed I would have to put my all in the third set and so I was focused from the offset. Thankfully I was able to pull through here and took the set and match with another 6-4 win!

On the second day of the tournament I was feeling happy with my win but my body was feeling the effects of a tough match. I was facing a Polish boy who proved to be very strong. When I took to the court I was nervous but I was also raring to go! I took the first set 6-2, with some of the best tennis I have ever played. However, similar to my first match, he raised his game and I lost the second set 2-6. As the third set got underway I felt pressure as this set would decide whether I got crucial points or not. I came out strong and managed to get an early lead, however ultimately I narrowly lost the third set 7-6.

Overall I was happy with how the week went and I'm looking forward to playing more tournaments in the future'.









Our students


### **Student Wellbeing**

Hertfordshire County Council (HCC) would like to hear parents' views about the Exceptional Needs Funding (ENF) system. ENF is HCC's system for distributing 'top up' funding to Hertfordshire mainstream schools, pre-schools and nurseries for children with SEND (special educational needs and/or disabilities) The survey is for parents/carers of children aged 3 to 18 years old with SEND

(special educational needs and/or disabilities) whose mainstream school, play group or nursery has applied for or been awarded ENF (exceptional needs funding) from 2016 onwards. The survey has been designed in partnership with Herts Parent Carer Involvement (HPCI) which is the parent carer forum for Hertfordshire and is
