## **Student Achievement**

Both girls are members of 1st Chiswell Green Guides and the award is in relation to the Girlguiding Anglia Macmillan Smarties challenge, where the aim was to raise £28 each, enough to pay for one hour of Macmillan nursing care (28 x £1 coins fit into one Smarties tube). Edie and Megan made beeswax wraps that they advertised for sale to friends and family for £2.50 each. They spent much of the May half term making the wraps and aimed to make as much money as possible as well as doing their bit to tackle the use of single use plastic as the wraps can be used as alternatives to Clingfilm. Having been nominated for the award they were successfully selected by a panel of judges from St. Stephens Parish Council and were presented with certificates at a

ceremony at Greenwood Park in September.

As with any school subject wider reading and engagement out of class will go a long way to boosting engagement and exam performance.


To boost this interest I would like to recommend a book and an upcoming TV documentary to help families get engaged in Science this half term.

## The Short History of Nearly Everything, Bill Bryson


Bill Bryson is an American author who has lived most of his adult life in Britain. He is well recognised as a travel and popular science writer. The book that I recommend is one of his science offerings.

A Short History of Nearly Everything, was written in 2003 and details many of the significant discoveries and developments across the whole spectrum of scientific disciplines that have

helped shaped our current understanding of the Earth, ourselves and our place within the wider Universe.



What makes this book particularly interesting are the stories of the scientists, some famous and some forgotten by history, that have contributed to our understanding. Bill Bryson writes about their lives, relationships and in some cases deaths intertwined with the details of their discoveries that makes the book not just interesting from a science point of view but also for the historians amongst us.

## Seven Worlds One Planet – David Attenborough. BBC One Sunday 27th October.

David Attenborough's natural history documentaries are always superb and provide us with an opportunity to witness truly amazing nature produced by some quite remarkable film makers from the comfort of our own homes. Over the years they have become powerful tools to educate us about the plight of the planet and everything that lives on it. This is especially true recently with the documentaries detailing the effects that the human race is having with our impact on global warming and climate change and the disposal of plastics into our oceans.

This new series focuses on the seven continents and was filmed in 40 different countries over 4

years. New filming technology including drones promises to get the viewer even nearer to nature.

The message running through the series will most definitely highlight our responsibility to good stewardship towards our planet. Surely an essential watch for us all.





## **Scholastics Book fair**





Thank you to everyone who bought from our book fair last week. We took over £300 which means we can choose £75 of new books for the LRC.


#### St Albans School's Book Award


Jack Mattingly is a genius.

> exciting titles, blurbs and introductions to their own






# Tales of the Gothic
