Dear Parents & Carers

Please read the advice below and re-inforce this with your sons and daughters particularly now as the nights draw-in. Should you or your children have any immediate concerns, please contact the police or if less urgent, your child's Director of Learning.

Keeping Safe in the Dark.

With the darker nights now upon us, it is important that students keep themselves safe and are aware of the dangers of the darker mornings and evenings.

Be aware of your surroundings and keep valuables such as phones out of public view whenever possible



- Do not loiter around after school, unless you have an after -school activity, go straight home.
- Try to walk with a friend or in groups so that you are more likely to be seen by drivers. Walk sensibly and stay on the pavements provided.
- Stick to well-lit paths and walk with confidence using routes you know well.
- Choose the most direct route with the fewest street crossings.
- Avoid taking short cuts through parks, vacant areas, fields and other places where there are not many people.
- Don't be distracted by your mobile. Be alert to what's happening around you. Ensure your mobile is charged so available for use should you need it.
- If you wear earphones, use the bud style ones and only one side so you are still aware of your surroundings
- If you cycle to school you MUST wear a helmet and have reflective lights.
- It is a legal requirement for you to have lights and reflectors fitted to your bike and so check your cycle lights are clean and are working correctly.
- Wear distinctive, reflective clothing especially if cycling to school. Reflective clothing on moving parts such as gloves, shoes or backpacks increases visibility.
- Only cycle sensibly (no wheelies or passengers) and on routes appropriate for your bike. Use cycle lanes where shown.

It is important to stay safe and be cautious at all times of the year, but it's particularly true this time of year as the mornings stay darker for longer and the afternoons and evenings become darker much sooner.

Remember BE Bright, BE Seen, BE Safe.

Year 7 Classics Game Changer Day

This Game Changer day on Monday 4th November launched us into the second half of this term. Each student was given the same resource and demonstrated a unique ability to absorb information, transferring this into their own work.





The students were excited to carve their Latin names on the clay tablet

supplied. Despite the practicalities of using the Latin alphabet to translate their names, this was a challenge nonetheless enjoyed.

After break the students were asked to research a particular myth writing numerous facts and replicating the myth by drawing it on a vase. Students began by exploring the architecture and how it represented the afterlife. This task focused on cultural memory. It seemed more appropriate as this day fell on Remembrance Day. As well as being able to translate pictorially the image on the surface of a vase students completed an extended piece of writing in the form of a diary.





The final task of the day allowed further research of the Ancient Greek philosophers.

Students were asked to find out at least ten facts about three or more philosophers of Ancient Greece and then develop their findings into journalistic writing.

Drama Game Changer Day - The National Theatre

On Thursday 14th November, 30 Year 9 and 10 students visited The National Theatre for a backstage tour and a workshop. Not only were the students able to sit in two of the National's theatres, The Lyttelton and The Dorfman, they also visited the set design workshop areas were they could see designers working on projects for upcoming shows. Our guides for the tour were very knowledgeable about the theatre's history and the various jobs their staff of around 1000 people do.





The day gave students an idea of some of the job roles in the theatre industry beyond actors and directors.

After lunch the students met one of the set designers from The National Theatre who talked to them about how a design idea gets from sketch to stage. One aspect of this is model boxes, the students where set the brief of designing a model box set for Alice In Wonderland, adapted to be set in a world inspired by a game of their choice.

The students were really creative with designs inspired by Minecraft, Tetris, Connect 4, The Sims, Fifa and Piano Tiles, to name just a few.

Year 9 Game Changer Day - The Beauty of Maths



A group of year 9 students spent the day exploring all things maths. We started by looking at patterns in numbers and discovered ways to determine divisibility of a number and even how to multiply very large numbers in our heads!

The second half of the day had us looking at codebreaking. We started with Caesar Ciphers one of the simplest and most widely known encryption techniques named after Julius Caesar, who used it in his private correspondence. Students then found out that a monoalphabetic cipher like this has four hundred septillion (400 000 000 000 000 000 000 000 000) different possible





combinations of solutions! We then learnt about frequency analysis to discover tricks on how to crack these.

Our day ended with a study of Enigma machines. We were fortunate enough to have Mr Fitzsimmons leading through our discoveries and he shared a digital programme that allowed us to manipulate all the parts of Enigma machines just as they did during World War II

It really was an exceptional day and I hope students remain as excited about their knowledge as when they left at the end of the school day.

rendition of Last Christmas. It was a lovely evening sharing music with so many of the local schools.










LRC News

The Globe Players

On Friday 25th October it wasn't in "fair Verona where we lay our scene", but Da Vinci Hall when the English department welcomed in The Globe Players to deliver a 60 minute version of 'Romeo and Juliet' with a difference to Year 10 students. The players explored the themes and characters, motivations and plot development, in an abridged version of the tragedy. The event proved to be a really enjoyable conclusion to our study of 'Romeo and Juliet'.



Endeavouring to enrich the curriculum for all and introduce another way to help Year 11 students to prepare for the PPEs in November The Globe Players went on to deliver a 60 minute version of 'An Inspector Calls transporting students to the fictional town of Brumley. Again, the players explored the themes and characters, motivations and plot structures, in an abridged version of the whodunit mystery. What was perhaps most rewarding for the students was the fact that the actors were able to explain some of the cultural context, developing the students' understanding of the issues that the playwright wanted to address.

Not to be outdone, the Year 7s were also taken to a world of renaissance theatre in a whistle stop tour of Shakespeare's best loved plays. The performances ranged from the tragic to the comedic, from tears of joy to lamentation. Although the students are not studying a Shakespeare text currently they will be soon. Having a light touch approach to Shakespeare ensured that the students were



unintimidated by the language and keen to pick up the bard in the near future.




