
Staff displayed the books they are currently reading on their office or classroom door and wrote a little bit about their favourite book or a book that had a big impact on them for a display in the LRC.






# The Big Read








# A Plea from the Art Department

On Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> January, Year 10 students took part in a full day of presentations and workshops entitled "The S Factor" from the award winning theatre group Tip of the Iceberg. The project gave students the opportunity to look at many attitudes, ideas and pressures experienced by
