


# **Celebrating Black History Month**



Mrs Wood also produced this <u>Sway</u> explaining the origins of Black History Month and providing some links to other websites with further information








Despite not being open to students at break and lunch time there has been lots happening in the LRC.

The overall winner was D-Day Dog by Tom Palmer

'Jack can't wait for the school trip to the D-Day landing beaches. It's his chance to learn more about the war heroes he has always admired - brave men like his dad, who is a reserve soldier. But when his dad is called up to action and things at home spiral out of control, everything Jack believes about war is thrown into question. Finding comfort only in the presence of his loyal dog, Finn, Jack is drawn to the heart-wrenching true story of one particular D-Day paratrooper. On 6 June 1944, Emile Corteil parachuted into France with his dog, Glen - and Jack is determined to discover their fate ... '








## Code Word Subsitutions

This is a fairly simple way of swapping code words for other words in messages. For this to work, both the writer of the code and the reader have to know about the code words. You could have them on a separate list...or hide them at the bottom of your coded message. Here's a good example of a 'code word swap code' which Hunter Jenkins would particularly enjoy.

#### Hunter's Poison

- Take two frog's legs and place in the bottom of a cauldron
- (Line the inside of the cauldron with tar to make the poison extra effective.)
- Add blended blood and a sprinkling of flaked bones
- Serve chilled

(poison = special shake; frog's legs = scoops of rocky road ice cream; cauldron = glass; Tar = chocolate sauce; Blood = milk; Bones= nuts)


Can you have a go at writing your own recipe using code word replacements? Make your recipe as scrummy in real life as you can...and as horrible and as gory in code form as you dare!

### Greece Trip, February 2020

We then ventured to the more mountainous region of ancient **Delphi**, which the ancient Greeks considered to be the centre of the world and the home of the oracle. Another highlight was visiting **Olympia**, where the original Olympic Games originated. The celebrations last for 5 days and include prayers, use of lights and colours and feasting.

# A Local Hero

In 1917, during the First World War, King George V (The Queen's grandfather) created some new honours to recognise hard work and bravery by British citizens who were not fighting in the front lines but were providing essential support to troops at the front. Three titles were awarded to military people: CBE (Commander of the British Empire); OBE (Officer of the British Empire) and MBE (Member of the British Empire). Later these honours were also awarded to civilians who made significant contributions in the areas of the arts, charity, education, health etc in their local areas.

Normally, these honours are announced at the beginning of the year and on The Queen's birthday. Unusually, due to this corona-crisis chaos, this year an extra group of people have received awards. Among them was an elderly relative of mine, who has been a long-term local



hero of the Bangladeshi community of St. Albans and the surrounding areas.

**Dabirul Islam Choudhury**, my great, great uncle, was born in 1920 in a small village in Bangladesh. He travelled to England in 1957 to study English Literature. He stayed to work as a foreman for Hawker Siddeley, after they bought the De Haviland Aircraft Company in 1960. He lived in St. Albans for a few decades and became a leader of the Bangladeshi community,



always involved in charity work. He continued to help the weak and needy when he moved to North London towards the end of the last millennium. When I met him, he was eager to recite poetry to me and bragged about being awarded a prize by Queen Elizabeth II for his poetry. I was impressed by his command of English and his amazing memory. Two years ago, he showed me one of his several published poetry collections; it had a foreword written by the Queen!

Earlier this year, he was inspired by Captain Thomas Moore to walk laps of his garden. A hundred years old, he set out to raise one thousand pounds by walking a hundred laps while fasting during Ramadan. Neither I nor he imagined that he would end up walking 970 laps and raise £420,000 for people who had been adversely affected by COVID-19.



I started to see him on the community TV channel, then on the BBC news. His grandson sent me links to newspaper articles about him on The Independent website and other national newspapers. Best of all, he called me after recently receiving his OBE,

"Where are you, come to my house, come and see all the things the Queen gave me."

I could imagine his beaming happy face. All the years of quietly helping others recognised by a

great honour. He inspired me to write poetry, **he inspired thousands to donate to charity**. Whatever age you are, young or old, every small effort and contribution can make a difference. He proved that when we do something good for others, it is hard to guess the many benefits we might gain as a result of these humble actions.
