Dear parents and carers

18th December 2020

I am utterly convinced that you will by now be growing weary of communications from me that sometimes are trying to be chirpy, sometimes lacking in clarity (despite my best attempts at decoding various dictats) but mostly trying to re-assure you that as always your children come first and always will do.

So here is the news about Covid as of today! From Monday 4th January 2021 the day when we are due to return to school, only Year 11s and 13s are expected to be here. Years 7, 8, 9, 10 & 12 will be asked to work at home and staff will set work and teach remotely as has worked so successfully the last few weeks when we shut down due to lack of staff.

For Year 11 & 13 their timetables will run the same way, their break/lunchtimes will operate the same way and there will continue to be staggered starts; if any of this changes over the holidays I will of course let you know. All staff will be in school and lessons will be delivered to the normal high standard according to our policy and procedures (please see website).

As we will be entering into Tier 3 you must also ensure that your children (Years 7, 8, 9, 10 & 12) are not out and about during the school day and are keeping themselves and you safe. As in previous lockdowns the children of key workers who fall into the following categories (below) are of course welcome into school but again please will you give the names to the following staff. This information would be must useful by Christmas Eve (I know I'm sorry!).

Your child has a social worker

There is also information about the reintroduction of Tutor Time and the knock-on effects of that on the timetable and different finishing times for each year group.

Miss Garrett had a lovely little boy and with the finest head of hair I have ever seen in one so tiny and Mrs Vitale has also had a gorgeous little boy. What a fine first Christmas they will all have!!

We bid farewell to Mrs Platt who has been a highly regarded Assistant Teacher and wish her every success as she starts journeys anew, she really has made such a difference to so many children – particularly with their maths and has been a great team player too.

It would be ridiculous of me to end this message as I would normally do as things are far from normal and there is so much worry out there for so many reasons, and for those reasons I fear my sentiments would have a hollow ring.

I am however going to end by saying let us hope 2020 has shown us that kindness is what matters to help us in our darkest days, that our friends and family are so important and that even on a wonky day here one of your children will always make me smile, laugh and in some cases shed a tear or two.

Just be safe with the ones you love – that you can be with; I will keep in touch of course should things change re: our opening dates or anything else in January as soon as I am made aware.

Whatever holiday you celebrate I do so hope it will be a happy one.

Information from Mr Paice - Pandemic Co-ordinator

Holidays and COVID

If you receive a POSITIVE COVID test result between now and the return to school, please follow the advice below:

Positive Test Received	Friday 18 th December – Thursday 24 th December	Friday 25 th December – Sunday 3 rd January 2021
Action Required	Notify the school via EDULINK as soon as the result has been received. The school will notify the persons who may have been in contact with the positive case. All notified individuals will be required to isolate for 10 days from last contact.	Unless testing was delayed following onset of symptoms whilst still at school, there is no need to contact the school. However, do contact the school on Monday the 4 th January 2021 if your child will be isolating.

Parental responsibility – parents are still required to notify close contacts, family and friends of a positive case and must follow the advice applicable at the time and appropriate to the various Tier restrictions.

Changes in the new School Year.

Testing within Schools

There has been exciting news released regarding tests that will be available at school in the New Year. These are called Lateral Flow Devices (LFD) and should be available in January. I will provide more information in January but it will mean that less staff and students have to isolate if a positive test is reported at school and more importantly it will ensure that students can remain at school and receive the teaching and learning that we all strive to give them in the knowledge that they are safe to do so. The World Health Organization have always said that the way out of this virus is to 'Test Test' and I am so pleased to say that this is exactly what we can now do.

In line with this news and after a full review of the Covid Safe measures we have in place, we feel that we can now change a couple of areas to provide greater support for the students in both their wellbeing and welfare.

Form Time:

From next year we will be reintroducing Form Time. This contact is vitally important and is something that we identified we desperately needed to reintroduce the notion of positive relationships with students and of course you as parents; it has been a noticeable miss from our timetable as a consequence of this finishing times <u>only</u> will change to the following:

Use of Halls for lunch and Break:

It can be difficult for both staff and students in managing break and lunch times when very cold or wet and we have had to identify safe areas for the students to congregate at these times to provide suitable social distancing. We have therefore decided that we will now open Pascal Hall during these times for the students to use. The area will be cleaned after each use and of course there will be supervision

The use of this area does however come with a small word of warning. As the students will be in closer proximity than they are at the moment, in the event of positive case it is anticipated more students could-be required to be isolated due to their closer contact with this person.

Uniform

In year 6 and in-year admissions, all students and parents sign a home school partnership agreement committing to our code, standards and uniform. For 99% of our community these standards are adhered to, there are however a considerable few who constantly let their school down and show no regard for the uniform rules.



This stops in January. There is plenty of time ahead to ensure coats are the right colour (black) and shoes are as presented in the uniform list and are <u>not</u> trainers. Should there be a financial reason why these purchases are difficult due to other commitments like the buying of mobile phones etc please contact Mr Stanton <u>a.stanton@marlborough.herts.sch.uk</u> so we can negotiate a package to help you. Students in the wrong uniform will be sent home once we have contacted you.

To help make this process as easy and effective as possible, we have updated our website with help and guidance on how to manage remote learning.






Marlborough Memories






The MO




The Big Read 2021


WINNER FCBG Children's Book Award 2019 (Older Readers Category)



Drama News

Sixth Form Playwrights

This academic year we have been lucky enough to have a sponsored place for The National Theatre New Views Playwriting competition. A level Drama and English students have been working to write their own 30 minute plays, which will be submitted, along with others from schools across the country, to The National Theatre. The overall winner's play will be performed by professionals at the National as part of their summer events season. Runners up will get a professional table read of their play.



This week the students took part in a 2 hour digital workshop with playwright Georgia Fitch, who took the students through a variety of exercises to create narrative, character and develop dialogue. These tools will support the student's with their script writing as well as in their Drama and English lessons.

After Christmas, each of the students will get some time with Georgia to read through their plays and gain some feedback on their ideas before they begin redrafting their work.

The students have really enjoyed the experience so far:

Year 11 Blood Brothers Workshop

On Monday 30th November Year 11 had a 'very 2020' experience by taking part in a drama workshop delivered digitally over Google Meet. The students worked with Michael and Steve, who have played Mickey and Sammy in the West End Production of Blood Brothers.

The focus of the workshop was getting students to consider the vocal and physical choices made by the actors and what this communicates to the audience. This is something that will support students with their written exam for Drama.

Thee students also had a chance to ask questions of Mike and Steve regarding their experience of playing the characters in a professional production.



Year 13 Performance



Year 13 drama students have been working to create their own piece of theatre from scratch.

Returning to school in September the student's were really interested in the impact the lockdown had had on people and decided that this would be the focus of their performance.

Working in the style of The PaperBirds Theatre Company, they set to work interviewing people about their experiences of lockdown and then used these interviews to create their script.

Character's ranged from first year university students who had been impacted by the lack of exams to NHS staff who worked the front line, to teachers and a new mum whose baby was born in lockdown. They worked hard to gather their information and wanted to give a voice to people who don't often get heard.

The piece was a huge success and I am very proud of the students.



Hertfordshire Updates

New guidance for making ASD referrals

Schools have received a range of updated guidance and information to support them in making referrals for CYP in educational settings: Guidance for making referrals, ASD School Questionnaire (completed by schools to initiate referral process), ASD Parent/Carer Pre-assessment Information (completed by parents with support from school) and a copy of the ASD referral Form which is then completed by a GP/Health Professional once Parent and School Info has been received.

Children and Young People's Therapies Advice Line

DSPL7 Updates

New Post 16 Transition Co-ordinator (SEND)

DSPL7 has appointed Rachel Robin to our new role of Post 16 Transition Co-ordinator. Rachel will be supporting vulnerable students in Y11 with SEND but without an EHCP for whom transition post 16 to college or an apprenticeship may prove difficult. Students are referred by schools in the DSPL7 area and will be supported through their first year of college or apprenticeship. Rachel will work with the student to explore post 16 options and support them through the transition process, ensuring that they make a successful move to their new learning environment.

It has been a busy term at DSPL7. Our SEND Family worker has supported 58 families with a range of strategies to support them to manage their child's needs at home. She currently has a waiting list of 13 families who will be contacted in the New Year. Our KS3 Mentor has worked with 20 young people from Y7-9, our Down Syndrome Advisory teacher has visited 9 schools to give advice and our new Post 16 co-ordinator has already received 14 referrals and made initial visits to schools.
