History Game Changer Day-Life on the Western Front

On Friday 12th of November, renowned historian, Steve Roberts, spent the day with over one hundred of our Year 8 students. They have been studying the First World War since September and had been excited for weeks about his visit. Steve, a veteran of the British Army for ten years, has worked on films such as Warhorse and with documentaries. He is an expert on the First World War and has many weapons and kit used by soldiers over a century ago in the trenches. Activities were engaging and I was delighted to receive such wonderful feedback from participants of the day.

Most items of equipment were not replicas . Steve brought in weapons and kit used by the British Army in the trenches.

Steve demonstrates the Lee Enfield rifle used by the British Army from 1914 onwards. This rifle was made in 1917.

Twenty students from the Marlborough Heritage Society (meeting Wednesday lunchtimes) investigated their family trees. Using Steve's extensive archival evidence, we found out about Isaac's relative being



lost at sea during the Battle of Jutland, Emma's relative who died fighting the Turkish Army in Jerusalem, and Jenny's relative from Bradford being killed just ten days before the end of the war - he was shelled by German artillery helping build a bridge in northern France.

Steve has kindly agreed to come back in January, so if you're interested in finding out more about a relative that died during the First World War please get in contact with our History Department.

FESTIVAL OF REMEMBRANCE 2021

For the past few months Heritage Club has been working on a new memorial that was displayed outside of A7 for the Festival of Remembrance. It depicts a young girl (based on the girl in Banksy's 'Girl with Balloon') reaching out to the silhouette of the girl's father as a soldier. I designed this piece of art to represent the loss of millions of soldiers' lives in war, but also the grief their families and friends were feeling when they died.

It was made by spray painting the ends of recycled plastic bottles and painting the middles black to make them look like poppies. Also, with the help of the DT department, we were able to add wires painted green as the stems. The silhouettes were designed by Year 8 artists from Heritage Club (and thanks must also go to Mr Smith in Design and Technology for cutting them out).




Students from Heritage Society were asked to design and make a memorial to celebrate 100 years of the Royal British Legion. We raised a fair bit for them too!

The piece also links nicely to our learning as Year 8 are studying the First World War in history lessons. On the 12^{th of} November we had a visit from a famous First World War military historian, Steve Roberts. He explained what kit soldiers were issued with and he even showed us some kit used in the trenches, including a Lee Enfield rifle from 1917! We discovered how and when soldiers used this kit and even acted out battle tactics. The lesson was interactive and very interesting.

Hopefully, it will remind people to donate to the Royal British Legion, who have provided support for a century (social, financial, and emotional) to veterans of the British Armed Forces and their families. You can donate any time, not just around the Festival of Remembrance. So, if you can, please do. Thanks, **Ivy.**

words. Jacob Jennings 8AP is in second place on our leader board with 1,112,024 words read and 19 quizzes passed.


The Big Read




