#### The Marlborough Science Academy Scholars Programme





During the Autumn term 10 students from years 8 and 9 embarked on our first 'Scholars Programme' with charity 'The Brilliant Club'.

The Brilliant Club is an award-winning charity that works across the UK to support and encourage young people to Access University and higher education programmes.

By bringing together two communities – PhD researchers and students – who might otherwise never interact with each other, young people can study innovative and inspiring topics that very few people have ever covered.

The Marlborough Scholars worked with PhD researcher Tom Pickford over 8 weeks experiencing university- style learning, culminating in a 1500-word final assignment exploring the use of Near-Infrared Spectroscopy and designing a machine to measure muscle oxygen levels in elite athletes. Assignments were marked by university lecturers using university assessment levels. We are delighted that all students passed their assignments with flying colours! Students researched the role of near-infrared spectroscopy (NIRS) in medical technology and engineering, culminating in their final project brief 'Designing a machine to measure oxygen levels for an elite athlete of your choice'.



To celebrate their achievements students were invited to attend a live graduation ceremony at the University of Southampton. During the day students enjoyed a tour of the Hampton Campus, met with current university students and were able to learn about Higher Education and university life.

An in-school celebration was also held to family and staff to congratulate students on their achievements, with Mrs Walker-Smith attending to award students their certificates and a copy of their final assignment.

When asked why students wanted to be involved in the programme, Thomas said "I wanted to be involved in the scholars programme to learn new skills such as researching and also to see what university will be like."

As a result of completing the programme Melayna said "I have learnt how to build or design as an engineer and how to write a mini 'thesis' incorporating what we learn in the sessions with my own research and knowledge. I have also got an insight of what studying in university might be like."

A huge congratulations to all students for all their hard work. They should be rightly proud of their achievements!


#### Art and Languages Game Changer Day

EASTER

Easter is one of the principal holidays, or feasts, of Christianity. It marks the Resurrection of Jesus three days after his death by crucifixion.

On Maundy Thursday Christians remember when Jesus ate the Passover meal with his disciples, breaking bread and drinking wine. Christians refer to this meal as the Last Supper.

Good Friday is a day of mourning in church. During special Good Friday services Christians remember Jesus's suffering and death on the cross, and what this means for their faith.

Easter Sunday marks Jesus's resurrection.

15th - 23rd April

Passover is a celebration of the story of Exodus. During Passover, Jews remember how their ancestors left slavery behind them when they were led out of Egypt by Moses.

The last day celebrates the arrival to the Red Sea. The final day of Passover celebrates when the free slaves made it to the Red Sea, where Moses parted it to help them get across. There is a tradition of women and girls lighting candles to commemorate this event.

Vaisakhi began in 1699, which is when Sikhism was formed as a faith. This celebration Commemorates Guru Gobind Singh, who was one of the original Sikh Gurus. People decorate their homes and places of worship with traditional brightly coloured garlands and flowers.



Social Media and Internet Safety

At The Marlborough Science Academy we take online safety very seriously and students are taught how to keep themselves safe online during ICT and PSHCEE lessons.

As parents there are lots of ways you can support your children including having regular conversations about the internet and social media from a young age.

Although most social media platforms are officially 13+, many children sign up to at least one when they are much younger.

Encourage them to be upfront with you rather than think that they need to keep it a secret.

Remind your child that every social media platform has privacy settings, and make sure they know how to use them.

Talk to your child about the sort of information they should keep private. Make sure your child understands how to report or block things that aren't appropriate.

If you have younger children you may be interested in YouTube Kids, an app specifically designed to manage the age appropriate use of YouTube. YouTube have recently introduced a new feature called Parent Allowlisting which allows

parents to approve a video or channel from the main YouTube platform to their child's You Tube Kids account. You can find a video

Each week as a leadership team we have the privilege of meeting with groups of students from Years 7 to 11 to talk to them about how they feel about their school and their learning. 

#### Accelerated Reader

All students in Years 7, 8 and 9 are enrolled in a reading scheme called Accelerated Reader. Students take a comprehension test to assess their reading ability and this helps to guide them to select appropriate reading material. When students finish a book on the scheme they can take a short online quiz to check their understanding of what they have read. Students earn house points for each quiz that they pass.


