Student Achievement

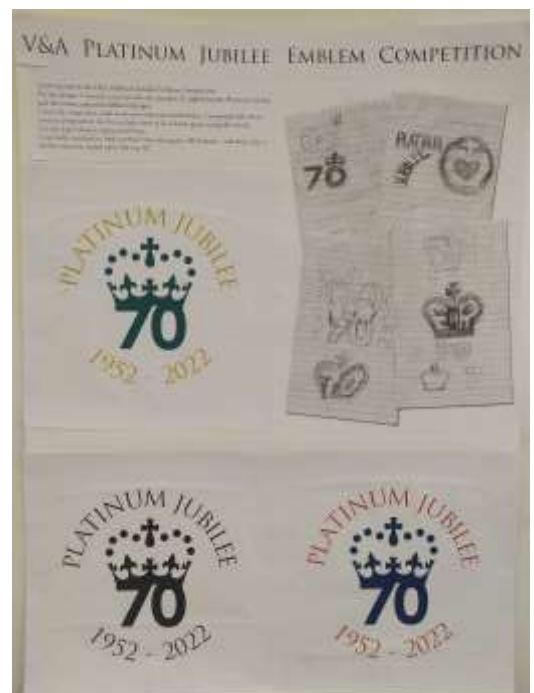
Alice Bernardini 11LB, currently sitting her GCSEs, has ranked in the top 10 of a recent national design competition to be exhibited in the Victoria and Albert Museum, Kingston, London. The competition in partnership with the Royal Household and the V&A was to design an emblem to be used throughout the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, this coming June.



Aimed at young people between the ages of 13 to 25, all the emblem designs went in front of a tough panel of judges including graphic designers, visual artists and design professionals, experts from the V&A, the Royal College of Art, the Design Museum, and a representative from the Royal Household, chaired by V&A Director Tristram Hunt. The winning design is set to be used on merchandise, all TV coverage, websites and the Royal Family's official social media accounts.



Alice's design consisted of a simplistic but elegant crown design sat on top of a large solid strong looking number 70, this was to represent the Queen's long and strong reign. Alice then set about deciding on her choice of colours, her first design remained all black. The use of black was to represent the Queen's elegance, strength and her power. Whilst not everyone has a positive opinion on the use of black, top fashion designs and the wealthy use black as a way to represent power, elegance and sophistication. Alice's other design incorporated the use of green and gold, colours linked to extravagance, wealth, riches, and vibrant health as well as life and renewal. Her other final design used blue and red, as a way of representing the Union Jack to symbolise the reign of Queen Elizabeth throughout the UK.



Alice's and the nine other entries will be exhibited at the V&A outside their National Art Library between June 1st and June 15th. Alice will spend the platinum jubilee dancing in the gardens of Buckingham Palace.

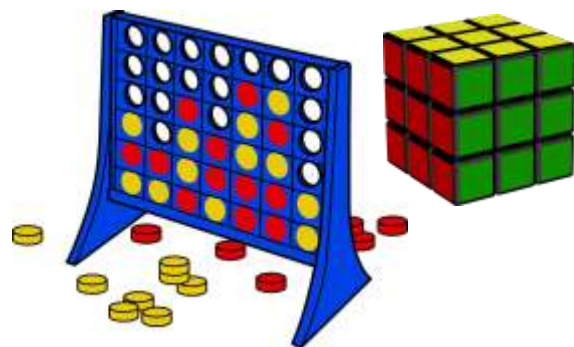

Art and English Picture Book Workshop

Over the course of the last two weeks Year 8 Art and English students have been working with the respective departments to write and illustrate their very own picture books. Once completed we plan to take our young authors and illustrators to a local primary school where they can share their stories.



Mr Theivamanoharan started the two weeks off with a session in the LRC, which first involved students discussing their memories of children's fiction. Students then broke into groups and dissected different children's stories, identifying what techniques writers used to make them so engaging. From there students considered how to plot their short stories, and by the afternoon developed these ideas into living, breathing words. Tales ranged from alien invasions to what it would be like to have dinosaurs for next-door neighbours. The end results were delightful, so too the young people that wrote them.

Ms Leggatt then took the budding young artists to illustrate their stories. The day started with a discussion on well-known illustrators, their styles and techniques, before moving on to discuss the characters the students had created and how they would describe them. Brainstorming their descriptions and doodling their characters, the students quickly became happy illustrators taking their ideas into the real drawings. Students

completed 5-10 illustrations to support their stories. These will now be made into a picture book by the Art department, before our students showcase their talents to a local primary school.

Accelerated Reader

All students in Years 7, 8 and 9 are enrolled in a reading scheme called Accelerated Reader. Students take a comprehension test to assess their reading ability and this helps to guide them to select appropriate reading material. When students finish a book on the scheme they can take a short online quiz to check their understanding of what they have read. Students earn house points for each quiz that they pass.



Students can take Accelerated Reader book quizzes at home Monday to Friday between 8.30am and 6pm. 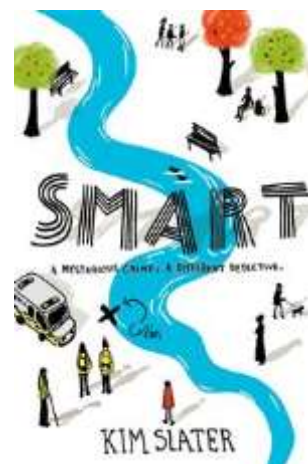

Brainstorm Project

In March Year 9 Drama students performed Brainstorm by Ned Glasier, Emily Lim and Company Three. This play focuses on what it is like to be a teenager today, the play is partly scripted about the physical changes the brain goes through in teenage years and partly devised by the students involved.

Year 9 worked in lesson time to create the devised sections relevant to themselves, we explored topics such as social media access, being able to ask questions of parents, feeling stuck between being a grown up and being a child, making and dealing with mistakes.

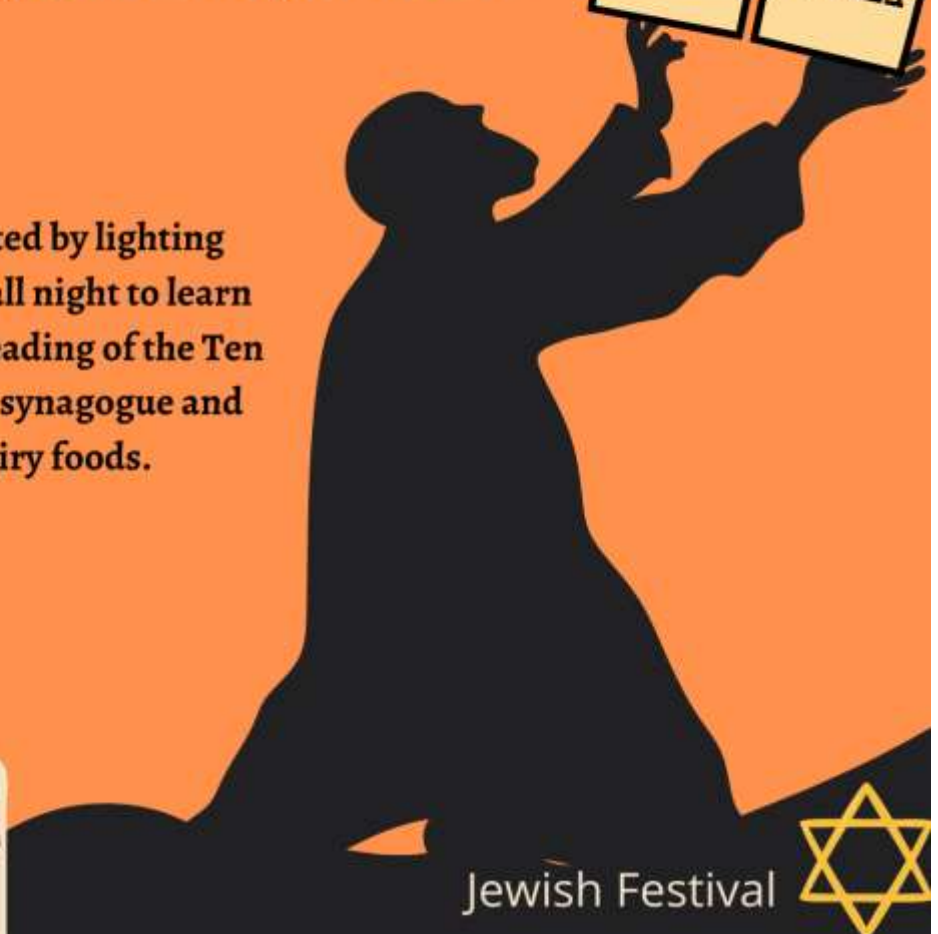
The holiday of Shavuot is a two-day holiday, beginning at sundown following the 5th of Sivan and lasting until nightfall on the 7th of Sivan (June 4-6, 2022).

Shavuot

The word Shavuot (or Shavuot) means “weeks.” It celebrates the completion of the seven-week Omer counting period between Passover and Shavuot.

The Torah was given by God to the Jewish people on Mount Sinai on Shavuot more than 3,300 years ago. Every year on the holiday of Shavuot Jews renew their acceptance of God’s gift, and God “re-gives” the Torah.

Shavout is celebrated by lighting candles, staying up all night to learn Torah, hearing the reading of the Ten Commandments in synagogue and feasting on dairy foods.
