## Year 10 Careers in Languages Day

On Monday 10th July, in support of our careers programme, the MFL Department invited three linguists to our school to talk to Year 10 students about their life-long career and professional experience.

Our Head of Department, Mr Henshall, hosted the session, introducing the speakers and sharing his own experience with learning languages, sitting GCSE exams and developing his career as a language professional.

The first speaker, Crispina Sanders, published translator, member of the Chartered Institute of Linguists and writer for the specialist language magazine Mary Glasgow, who also visited our school last year to share her passion for languages with Year 10 pupils, spoke about Hermes, the ancient Greek god of translation, the inconspicuous position of interpreters in facilitating communication and the crucial contribution of public service interpreters to society as a whole.





Byron Campbell, sign language interpreter, trainer and consultant, shared his 35-year-long experience working as an interpreter and spoke about his assignments interpreting for Princess Diana and the Pope. Byron mentioned the pathways into becoming a sign language interpreter, the situations when a deaf person might require an interpreter and the range of payments linguists might receive whilst working in the public and private sector.





Our third speaker was Jennifer Hogg, French and Italian conference interpreter and translator, who shared with our students one of the practical tools she used when training interpreters – mirroring. Students worked in groups of three to simultaneously listen and repeat a speech in English to their peers. The following tasks involved listening and interpreting speeches in French and Spanish – thank you to our colleagues Ms Short and Mrs Morrissey for presenting the material, in line with GCSE conversation themes.

We are also very grateful to the Site Team, the Music Department, the Reception Team and SLT for their ongoing support and crucial contribution in organising these sessions highlighting the importance of languages in the labour market."





## MFL On Tour: France 2023

On Saturday the 27<sup>th</sup> of May Mr. Henshall and his team took 45 Year 9 students to France to explore French culture and living. Despite the threat of long delays at the ferry terminal, we are happy to report there were no issues with the sailing and we landed in France with oodles of time to spare.

Our first stop was the breath-taking Vimy Ridge where Mr. Dwane delivered a speech explaining the importance of the monument and why it is important that we stop there. On the opening day of the Battle of Arras, 9 April 1917, the four divisions of the Canadian Corps, fighting side by side for the first time, scored a huge tactical victory in the capture of the 60 metre high Vimy Ridge.

After the war, the highest point of the ridge was chosen as the site of the great memorial to all Canadians who served their country in battle during the First World War, and particularly to the 60,000 who gave their lives in France. It also bears the names of 11,000 Canadian servicemen who died in France -



many of them in the fight for Vimy Ridge - who have no known grave. The memorial was designed by W.S. Allward. It was unveiled by King Edward VIII on 26 July 1936.



Day two brought great excitement as we headed off to Parc Asterix for a day of fun, adrenaline and sunshine. Parc Asterix is one of the most popular theme parks in France and is close to the capital in Paris. With over 2 million people attending each year, the famous comic books come to life in their own dedicated theme park.

While Disneyland is typically what everyone thinks of when they think of France, most of our students prefer Parc Asterix due to the shorter queue times and the sheer volume of big roller coasters that it has to offer which was noted by **Brandon who felt:** "the roller coasters went so fast! It was great fun and my

friends and I had the most fun here."

Day three brought us to the beautiful medieval town of Provins. Located in Île-de-France in the Seine-et-Marne department, the historic walled city of Provins is an outstanding and authentic example of a medieval fair town in Champagne, a region that was an important centre of exchange, and which witnessed, together with the rise of trading fairs in the 11th century, the beginning of significant international trade in Europe. Of international scope, these trade fairs which targeted merchants and traders required the protection of long-distance freight transport between Europe and the East, encouraging the development of activities such as banking and foreign exchange, as well as productive activities.



The urban layout and the medieval dwellings that remain in Provins are an outstanding example of an architectural ensemble built specially to fulfil these functions. This complex includes merchant houses, vaulted cellars and warehouses, outdoor spaces for trade, and religious ensembles. The city is also known for its well-preserved defence system, which was built for the protection of the fairs.




However, the fun didn't end there. After a train ride through the French countryside, we arrived at our Velorail activity. This was great fun and really took the students by surprise. We meandered through the French countryside in the beautiful sunshine and had a rare old time seeing who could pedal the fastest... unfortunately this wasn't Mr. Henshall.

Although Provins suffered some destruction during the Hundred Years War in the 14th and 15th centuries, as well as during the French Revolution, it was quite minimal. The urban plan of the medieval town is well preserved, as are a large part of the historic buildings, canals, and the water management system. Some 150 historic houses have preserved their medieval vaulted cellars, intended for the storage of goods. Despite minor changes since the 17th century, the city has preserved its integrity and that of the places associated with the various functions of the fairs.

Our last full day was spent in Disneyland Paris where students got to witness the magic of Disney come to life as well as experience the fantastic rides and meet and greet the characters. We spent the entire day in the park and ended our amazing day watching the illuminations and fireworks which left everyone with the feels. **Maya in Year 9 said**: *"I loved Disneyland because everywhere you looked there was a story. The props were designed in detail which really transported you into another world".* 

Wednesday morning arrived like a dull September morning... none of us wanted to go home and would happily have headed back to Disneyland for another day of fun and frolics. However, we were on our way and enjoyed one last stop at a beautiful Cathedral before embarking on the journey home.

And so, ends another fantastic trip to France. As the French would say: jusqu'à plus tard.

The overall winners were **Saturn** followed by Mars in second place, Neptune in third and Mercury in 4th.



This year, Marlborough focused on expanding our student-led groups. As a result, more students joined the diversity team after witnessing the positive impact of Religion Week celebrations. In January, the diversity group was trained by 'EqualiTeach' under the Agents for Change program. The training left our diversity ambassadors feeling empowered and excited about making positive changes. A few weeks later, the ambassadors delivered a presentation about celebrating neurodiversity during form time. Recently, members of parliament and diversity ambassadors collaborated to celebrate South Asian Heritage Month. Around 9% of our student population has South Asian heritage, and students learned about Britain's relationship with South Asian countries to educate and promote kindness and compassion for all.

There a dream that everyone is treated as equals At the beginning of the year, during Black History Month, the school made 'I Have Dream' statements based on Martin Luther King's infamous speech. Each form class wrote 'I have a dream' statement; it was clear from this activity that the students wanted a cultural celebration day. We celebrated this on Monday 17th July, the students explored and learned about different cultures through games, movies, and art/ music.

The canteen prepared bite-size nibbles showcasing food from around the world. There were glowing reviews about the food, especially the spicy beef burrito from Mexico, the steamed veggie bao bun from China, and the veggie falafal with mint yoghurt from Israel. Our students crowned the Jerk Chicken from Jamaica as their favourite. The diversity group wanted to give back by raising money for charity. We chose to support the charity Read Foundation and donated to the 'build a school' fund. Students paid £1 for henna designs on Cultural Heritage Day. In true Marlborough spirit, the henna stall was run by staff and students who kindly volunteered their time. On Monday, we raised £71.60 cash from the Henna stall and parents/careers donated an additional £47 on School Gateway, making the total of £118.60.

Our students and staff members worked together and learned how to play culturally diverse board games. Many of our students tried new games which they may not have played before. A firm favourite was Mancala, which is played in parts of Africa. Another favourite was the Carrom board, which originates in parts of South Asia.



Our sporty students appreciated the range of sports games on offer. The students leaped at the opportunity to play Kabaddi, a popular South Asian sport. We thank our staff members who taught the students to play Gaelic football and hurling. Our students showed great communication skills and interest in learning the rules of these games played in different countries.


