

Box House Theatre Workshop

On the 16th November, the Year 10 drama class were lucky enough to take part in a drama workshop

run by **Box House Theatre** company to hone our devising skills

Throughout the duration of the workshop we covered three different styles of theatre. The first kind was 'Physical Theatre'. We looked at ways to use our bodies to show emotions and scenes. We were given a piece of paper and we had to choose a word and then write connotations of the word. My group chose 'dreams' then we split off into partners and, in conjunction with three pieces of music, had to do some physical theatre based on 5 words we associated with the word we chose.

Next up was the theatre company's own style 'Platform Theatre'. Platform theatre is a very creative kind of theatre because it's all done in a small rectangle space but that doesn't limit what you can do with it and as they showed us, even with a small space you can still create anything. We learned some of their techniques such as drawing imaginary objects and using people to create objects. We used both these skills to recreate famous children's stories. It was quite difficult at first but once we got into the swing of things it ended up being a lot of fun and we all really enjoyed it and I





can see how it would be used in our own performance work.

And last but not least we have 'Naturalistic Theatre'. At the start we all were in a circle and were told to talk amongst ourselves but after a couple of minutes of the workshop, people told us that there was a nuclear weapon dropping on England and we had to devise a plan. At the start we all were taken aback and were joking about it but we then settled and we were given roles and scenarios to discuss. We managed to create branches of stories just by discussing. It was really interesting to see peoples responses to the scenarios, I particularly enjoyed this style and will use this technique as a way to create work for our devised piece.

Overall I really enjoyed the workshop and I think it was really helpful when it comes to devising our own performances.

Accelerated Reader

All students in Years 7 and 8 are enrolled in a reading scheme called

Accelerated Reader. Students take a comprehension test to assess their reading ability and this helps to guide them to select appropriate reading material. When students finish a book on the scheme they can take a short online quiz to check their understanding of what they have read. Students earn house points for each quiz that they pass.




These are added at the end of each half term.
