





and the talk began. It started with


the author introducing herself and her well known books such as Beetle Boy and her co written series of Adventures on Trains.



raffle and a Big Read themed



although there is no obligation for students to ask family and friends to sponsor them, all money raised will help Read for Good provide new books and storytellers for children's hospitals in the UK.


