Kylie is a triple Paralympian of the London, Rio and Tokyo Games and became the first woman to ever win a Paralympic Gold medal in Wheelchair Rugby when GB beat USA in 2020. Kylie's journey is incredible and the students learnt so much in such a short space of time about the link between core values in sport and everyday life. The day then consisted of a variety of workshops in roundnet, pickle ball and activities on developing these core values such as trust, communication, diversity, courage, team work and determination.

#### Art News



#### Accelerated Reader

All students in Years 7 and 8 are enrolled in a reading scheme called Accelerated Reader. Students take a comprehension test to assess their reading ability and this helps to guide them to select appropriate reading material. When students finish a book on the scheme they can take a short online quiz to check their understanding of what they have read. Students earn house points for each quiz that they pass. These are added at the end of each half term.

#### The Big Read 2024

Students have been completing work linked to our Big Read in History, Geography and Art. In History, students learnt about the use of carrier pigeons in World War I and discussed the advantages and disadvantages of sending messages this way. In Geography Year 7 looked at the map of the fictional Ave's Wood in Twitch and compared it to the map of Cromwell Bottom Nature Reserve on which Ave's Wood is based. Students then created their own map based on a real place.

In Art, Year 7 looked at the bird illustrations of American artist Charley Harper and then created their own bird pictures.

Twitch intertwines the themes of protecting wildlife and being kind to one another and links with our sustainability ethos and our values.

#### **Eco-Committee update**

As we continue to strive towards our goal of attaining the eco-schools green flag accreditation for the 2023/2024 academic year, our eco-committee have been hard at work brainstorming and planning exciting initiatives to foster a more sustainably conscious school community.

Over the past several weeks, our dedicated eco-committee students have been working hard to raise awareness of the detrimental impacts of litter on our local environment. Students have conducted a thorough 'recycling bin availability survey' to assess the accessibility of recycling points both within our school buildings and outside on our grounds as a whole. The data these students gathered has since allowed us to identify under provisioned areas and is helping us apply a more targeted strategy to improving our school's recycling infrastructure. The eco-committee haven't been scared to get their hands dirty too; armed with bags, litter pickers and determination, they've rolled up their sleeves and been out on more than one lunchtime, taking an active role in keeping our school tidy.



With the anticipated arrival of warmer weather in the coming weeks and months, we are eagerly awaiting the opportunity to break ground on our eco garden project. The area at the back of B7 is currently an unused corner of land. We hope to turn this space into a biodiverse, communal garden that promotes wellbeing by allowing students to surround themselves in nature and provides a refuge to native insect and birdlife. Preliminary work has been ongoing with the area-development club striving to create seating for the garden over these winter months. We look forward to updating you soon with the progress of our garden.

#### **Careers** News


On Friday 1st March, Year 12 students visited the UK University Search Fair at The Tottenham Hotspur Stadium.





#### **Student Leader Conference**

On Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> February Marlborough's Student Leaders attended the Alban Partnership Student Leadership Conference at the Vineyard Church in St Albans. After an opportunity to mingle with other Student Leaders from the consortium schools during breakfast, the students engaged in a variety of ice breaker tasks including bingo and catch a cup.

The day began with an inspirational 'Ted Talk' from Mike Palin, who captivated our Student Leaders with some thought-provoking information. People are living longer if they live in the 'blue zones' across the globe. Why is this though? It's not just as a result of lifestyle factors such as exercise and diet, but belonging to neighbourhood with a strong sense of community and togetherness. This lit a spark in our students and when given the opportunity to reflect, they were challenged to think about how they could develop a sense of community within their own schools. Our Student Leaders were delighted that this is something that they have already begun to develop through one of their aims 'improving inter-year links', in particular, through beginning to raise the profile of the house system.



The idea of a conference led by the consortiums Student Leaders was introduced to them. An opportunity to bring the local schools together and inspire a generation to develop a sense of community in their schools. The Student Leaders worked with students from the consortium to plan the conference and present to the rest of the group, taking questions at the end. Not only did our young people step out of their comfort zone and share ideas with people who they did not know, they were able to stand confidently in front of the rest of the group and use their public speaking skills to enthuse their listeners.

To finish the day, the students were introduced to members of the church who work to provide food for the local community. They were given a tour of the food bank, the storage units and the shops that accompany these that allow members of the community to use this support. The students saw first hand who donates to these banks, the processes these items have to go through before they are made available to those who need them and the restrictions that come with this. This hit home for many and our young people were shocked to hear that many thousands of food banks are running in our country. Having said this, there was a heart warming moment to see the emotions of one of the members of the church who explained how rewarding it is to help her community in this way. What might seem so little to some, is so much to someone else.

It was a really insightful day for all. Students came away with a real sense of purpose and determination to make their school environment a welcoming one and one that everyone should feel a part of.


