Battlefields Trip

In April Year 9 and 10 students studying history at GCSE spent three days exploring the battlefields and cemeteries of the First World War's Western Front. We were lucky enough to have Steve Roberts, renowned historian, as our tour guide.

Students observed the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate, a ceremony to remember those British and Commonwealth soldiers who gave their lives defending Ypres, that has continued every evening since 1928.

A visit to the Somme battlefields, Sunken Lane and Thiepval, where students study the tragic story of the Salford Pals in Year 8, was followed by workshops on equipment, weapons, and medicine.



We also visited Hill 60 where St Albans soldier, Ted Warner, won the Victoria Cross in 1915.

Six of our students went on pilgrimages to visit the headstones or memorials of their relatives, which ended with our own ceremony at Tyne Cot cemetery where we laid a wreath of poppies.

Normandy 2024

On Thursday 4th April we arrived at school to start our voyage to Normandie. We boarded our ferry and 7 hours later arrived at Le Château de la Boutonnière, which we would call home for the next five days. We were given a tour of the beautiful grounds and completed our first French lesson.



During the first day we stayed at the chateau and did some fun activities. The first of which was the *fabrication du pain* (bread making). We later got to eat this delicious bread for lunch. For our second activity we headed into the woods for *le tir à l'arc* (archery). C'était super cool. On this magnificent site, they make cider, and we were lucky enough to try some. In the evening we did an exciting treasure hunt where we had to find different locations around that chateau. Much to everyone's dismay, the teachers won. Then it was straight to bed after an exhausting day.

The second day we went to Arromanches which is where the D-Day landings took place. There, we looked around an interesting museum about it. For lunch, we had a picnic which was nice. In the afternoon, we headed into a 360° cinema to further our D-day knowledge. Finally, we went to an eerily beautiful American cemetery. For dinner that night, we got to try *l'escargot* (snails); they were garlicky and chewy. When we arrived back at the Chateau, some people dressed up for a quiz about French culture.



Now the day we were all waiting for had arrived. In the morning, we headed for a French market to immerse ourselves further into French culture by practising our speaking skills when talking to the native people. We then went to the famous Mont-Saint-Michel - the number 1 tourist attraction outside of Paris - where monks used to live. *C'est beau*. At the top of the island is the monastery where we looked around and marvelled at the beautiful architecture. Then we headed back to the Chateau.

Accelerated Reader

All students in Years 7 and 8 are enrolled in a reading scheme called Accelerated Reader. Students take a comprehension test to assess their reading ability and this helps to guide them to select appropriate reading material. When students finish a book on the scheme they can take a short online quiz to check their understanding of what they have read. Students earn house points for each quiz that they pass. These are added at the end of each half term.

Student Parliament

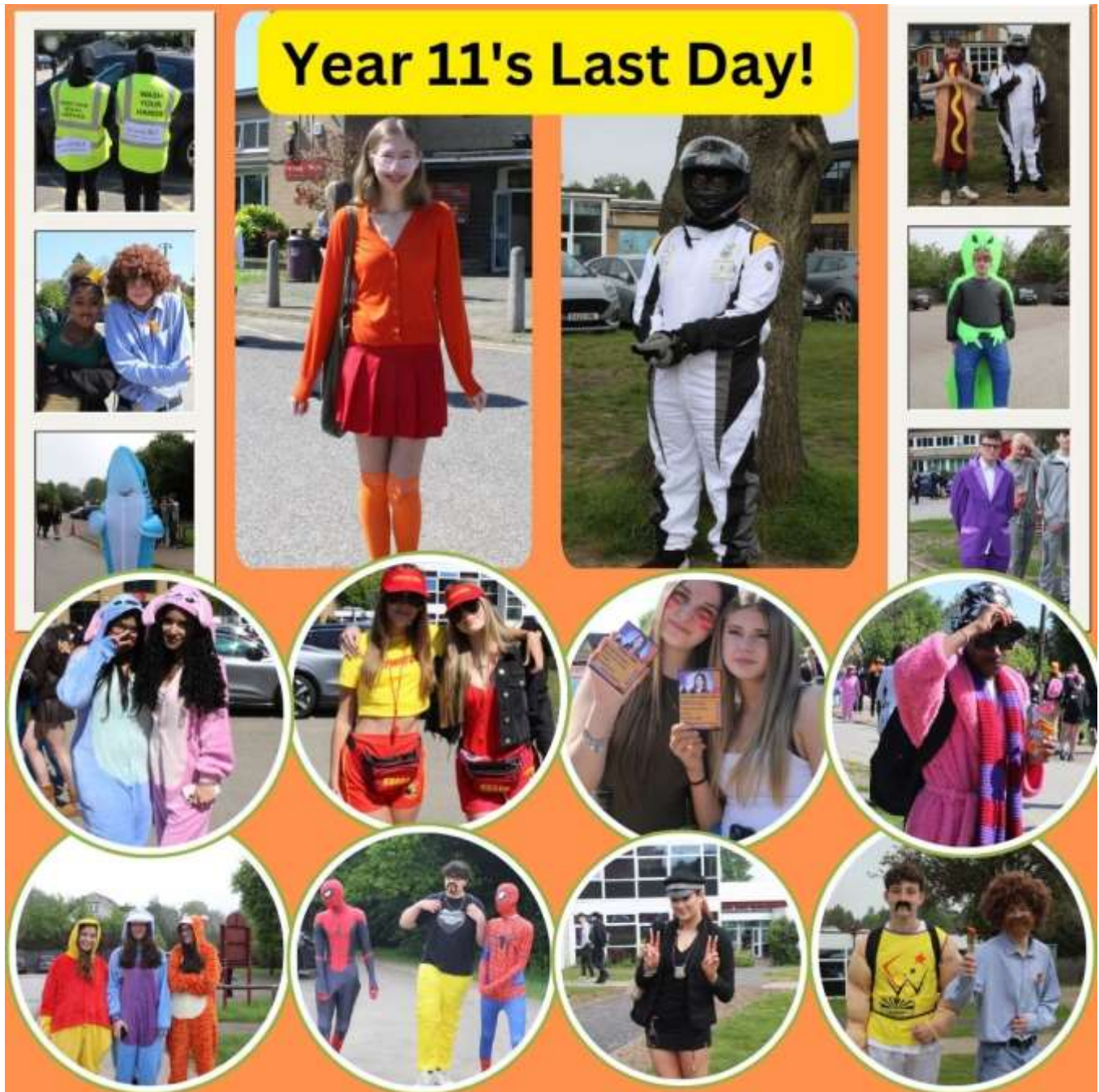

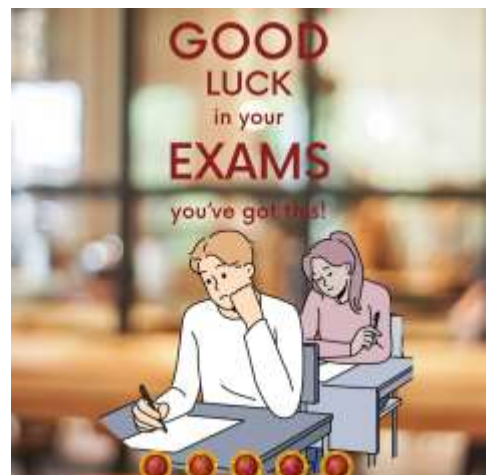

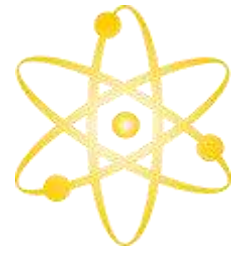
